So I was excited when I learned she was writing a novel, and nervous when she asked me to review it. It's difficult enough to be critical of a fellow author's work, but even more difficult when that author is also a friend. I already knew the novel's premise (and loved it), and we had discussed it occasionally during her writing process. Thus, I was hopeful that I would like what I read.

And I did. Heather Grace Stewart has written a romantic comedy that inspires us to leap into our fantasies in the pursuit of our hearts' desires. And yet, we come out on the other side willing to take fate into our own hands.

First off, let's talk about the novel's title. I loved it from day one. It's the kind of title (and premise) that made me wish I'd thought of it. Right off the bat the reader knows she's in for something fun and whimsical. Ms. Stewart's novel delivered on that. The novel balanced comedy with tragedy, magic with reality. As a reader, I was completely willing to suspend my belief and go along for the ride into the world of time-traveling, Wii-dwelling genies, and I delighted in doing so. In short, it was a page-turner.

Ms. Stewart also delivered on dimensional characters that were flawed, yet lovable. Cat Glamour has suffered the consequences of spousal abuse, emotional eating, and low self-esteem. And although she didn't have the a-ha moment I was looking for, she was a character worth rooting for, one with humor and support despite her past mistakes, and one who evolves. The genie (a.k.a "Gene") was perfectly imperfect, deliciously handsome yet quite fallible as a genie. As these two push each other's buttons while trying to resist each other's bodies, the reader finds herself conjuring playful wishes of her own.

Overall, Ms. Stewart has crafted a story with structure and development, and a resolution that will keep book clubs discussing and debating for hours. I found myself thinking about it days after I'd finished reading, proof that the book had gotten under my skin. As a novelist, I love when that happens.

As a debut novel, **Strangely, Incredibly Good** is just that. Heather Grace Stewart is a storyteller, and I am already looking forward to her next novel.

The main character calls herself fat throughout the book. (In fiction, that is a diverse body type.) "The problem was, I just couldn't hop out of bed. That would require energy, and a sense of hope." That line speaks to the chronically ill, the depressed, the overweight, etc -- it works on so many levels. Later, however, she's able to do physical activities just by changing her attitude. Increasing her strength and dexterity just by believing in herself. (If only that worked in tabletop RPG... am I right? Ha!)

Part of the book, the theme in a way, is to find self-love. "I hate how society makes you feel that you are the size you wear." Quotes like that make this a riveting social commentary.

The book, published back in January 2016, should have a meme or two floating around. Eugene mentions how wishes aren't always used wisely. "Take Donald Trump. He never asked for great hair. He asked for great wealth." As I said, there should be a meme or two out there. Plus, later in the book, it mentions a genie probably being in the White House, catering to POTUS. Again, it's funny considering when the book came out.

Early on, the book makes one wonder who "little Logan" was. But it tells the sad story of an abusive

marriage long before getting into a moment in the past where everything could have changed. The book has a lot of flashbacks. It seems like it has a "Dead Man's Curve" cliché, but then it tosses in a twist to keep things fresh. I loved that about this book.

My very favorite part of this book was the description of the Book Mobile.

And yes, the grandmother character gives a real Twitter handle! Hasn't tweeted in some time, but still. I love that kind of authenticity.

This quirky, modern twist on a genie-in-a-bottle fairytale surprised me. I wasn't sure what to expect from a story about a man popping out of a Wii machine, but was pleased to find an unexpected story unfold throughout this short but sweet novel.

However, I soon realised that *Strangely, Incredibly Good* was curve-positive – enforcing the message that body shape isn't what defines a happy life.
