What a great, very different, novel this is! Welcome to the Farinelli family from Brighton - it has a great collection of characters who are brought to life in the pages of this story, some of whom you'll love but others you'll definitely not!

There's the domineering, strident Italian Mama, a real matriarchal character and the mother of two sons, Massimo and Nico. Both sons have married for the second time and the story is related from the points of views of their second wives, Lara and Maggie. Lara and Massimo have a son, Sandro, and appear to have the perfect marriage - but appearances are often deceptive, particularly so in this family's case!

This is a story of secrets, abusive relationships, one where the 'golden' son is actually anything but. It involves the two second wives developing their relationship to start to trust one another and reveal confidences which lead to dramatic events. This is a story where lies are perpetuated and maintained to keep the family together but at what cost? What will happen when all is revealed and there's nothing to hide behind any more? It is a very moving story filled with deception, betrayal and, contrastingly, loyalty, love, caring and forgiveness. Overall, this is about a dysfunctional family and it has a brilliant ending!

The Silent Wife by Kerry Fisher was previously called 'Secrets of Second Wives', a title I much prefer.

Be careful what you wish for - you may get it. This is certainly true of Maggie, a woman from a less than desirable background; growing up on a council estate, a single mother, the daughter of single mother. All she has ever wanted is to be part of a close family, one of those families that do everything together, that support each other. When Nico asks her to marry him, she believes that this is just what she is getting, but this family is so close that she finds herself on the outside looking in. And then she makes a startling discovery, one that has the power to tear this family apart.

The Silent Wife deals with the plethora of relationships a second wife faces as a newcomer; being a step-parent; bringing a child of her own into the relationship; the in-laws; the ghost of the dead wife. It also deals with family violence. So there was a lot to work with here, but unfortunately Kerry Fisher just didn't quite pull it off.

This was an okay read that, at times, had flashes of brilliance, whereafter it would slip back into mediocrity. There were so many similes! So many that I was actually gnashing my teeth at one point. It had a lot of potential that was not, in my opinion, explored. We don't really get any great depth to the characters. There is a lot of repetition. A LOT.

This book was interesting to the point that I wanted to keep reading, encouraged by the occasional flash of brilliant writing, but it was not so good that I became absorbed by it. The Silent Wife earns

3.5 stars from me.

All families are crazy. This is what my great-grandmother used to say. Boy did she was right! Families are tricky, **you are handled carefully weaved small threads, connections to all those people that share your name and blood – or not, and those little bonds get tangled, they loosen, they get older, they keep messing with your head. Families are a blessing. But families can also be a curse!**

The Farinellis, a seemingly nice and happy big Italian family, know all about what a family is about. **At least that is what they think. Lara will do anything for her husband and son to be happy, even if it means losing herself in the process. Maggie is the new piece, the “blended” member trying her best to fit the picture and the empty seat left by the deceased first wife of her beloved husband.** Through those women’s eyes, you get to know their husbands, **the very different but equally strong men Massimo and Nico.** To say their views on life are different is a euphemism, but brotherhood is a strong bond and those two are navigating life together, through thin and thick. **Add to the mix the next generation, Sam, Sandro and Francesca** to spice up the adults’ life and bring joy to the party. **Guarding the family is the mama, Anna.** Resilient, old-fashioned Anna whose tongue is always ready to let slip a scathing comment or a nasty remark to her daughters-in-law while her warmth is enveloping and cherishing those two perfect sons life has blessed her with.

But this portray is simplistic. You could have guessed all of this from a family picture hanged on the wall.

I knew outsiders only saw a fraction of what a marriage was really like.

With The Silent Wife, we are off to the real thing. The author’s writing breathes life. What happens when the photographer says “it’s a wrap!”? Kerry Fisher shows it all. The masks appearances force you to wear, the pressure that comes with a family, the shadows, the secrets. Chapter after chapter, layers are removed, the wounds start hurting, the cracks on the wall appear, the feelings just flow and you are left with the meaning of the sense of belonging, with what it truly means to be a family.

For once in my life, I wanted to surrender to romance, to believe love was sparkly and special and not something that made you look in the mirror and shake your head at your own stupidity.

Maggie and Lara couldn't be more different. I don't want to dive too much into characterization because the book is an experience about who you are, who you appear to be, who you want to be and how you can relate to those around you. All of this is locked away, for different reasons. Lara cannot let her husband and his perfect life down by revealing what is eating her soul every day and Maggie won't destroy the newly found happiness and solace of her new husband and his reluctant daughter. **But secrets have a knack for bringing everything to the surface.**

I warmed to both women for very different reasons. Maggie was the stepmother I wish I had had growing up! **She tries her best to protect what she is slowly and tentatively building. I know what it feels to be treated as a second choice, as if you are just here to fill a gap, as if you don't quite fit into the picture.** She felt real and warm and really trying, even if painfully aware her ways are the opposite of what is done on the Italian side. **The Farinelli family is close-knit and doesn't let strangers in so easily. Lara learned it the hard way.** The many years since her wedding hasn't made her more comfortable around her mother-in-law and her son's upbringing is a constant issue in the family. Their struggles, their daily lives, their voices sounded spot-on, I imagined them as my aunts, my cousins, and **I felt for and with them.**

I think what made me feel so connected to Lara and Maggie from the start was the mixture of emotions coming from their different narrations. The guarded Lara and the new-addition Maggie, two different views of the same coin. **I love how Kerry Fisher seized the way we tiptoe around people, the way we try to cope with our own feelings and interpret others', the way something simple can bring people together when they least expect it,** the way you can find allies in people you had no intention of letting in, because life happens and when you are faced with its hardships or happy moments. You may find someone standing right next to you, holding out a hand. That is also what family is for.

I am noseey and I must say this story delivers on the promise to let you hide behind the curtains and see what happens behind closed doors. It's not all bad, grey is all around, and I am happy the author gives room for opinions to be formed and evolve as the characters grow.

Finally, I was understanding what it meant to be a grown-up.

Getting to know everyone else through Maggie and Lara's eyes was an excellent way of witnessing the difference faces we put on depending on who is around! If something had made me angry during Lara's narration, Maggie's light on the same character, event or day would have my feelings completely changed. If Maggie's light tone or complaint would irritate me a little, Lara's fresh eyes on it would give it another meaning. **With a clever array of secondary characters to spice already-packed lives, the steady pace of the story never lets up.**

I dreaded the secret wouldn't let any room for character development but I must have forgotten how every single day shape us, no matter what hovers over our heads, and this is depicted so clearly in *The Silent Wife* that you might start looking around you with more open eyes. Kerry Fisher masters the magic of capturing life through all angles and delivering it to you raw and real.

I'd once had a boyfriend who called me "Shnoodle Bum". It had put me off nicknames for life.

The tension was different from a thriller or an action-packed story. It crept on me as I dived deeper and deeper into the family's troubled waters, and the secret had my heart break, shake with fear, the undercurrent of dread coming in waves as every day troubles offered a respite from the darkest times.

My heart ached for that family, for the lost ones, for the found ones. I loved every minute, every page, every word of this heart-wrenching book!

The author's fantastic and emotional writing turns a seemingly normal family story into a gripping roller coaster journey about how a secret can shake the foundation of a perfect picture, revealing just how bonds can be strong, cut, tested, created and renewed, for the sake of happiness.

Can a review consist of just some incoherent gibberish to show how much you've loved a book? How about a Kermit flail? No? Because quite frankly, I'm not at all sure how I'm supposed to put into words the emotional rollercoaster I've been on following this story of a dysfunctional and slightly cuckoo family.

It's all incredibly relatable. Who hasn't had to play happy families when sticking a fork in your eye sounds way more fun? Who hasn't maybe worn a mask when visitors arrive ten seconds after you've had an argument with your other half because it's none of their business? But then imagine having to wear that mask day in, day out. Live your life pretending so you don't rock the boat. I don't know about you but I would go crazy!

Thank goodness I had the house to myself as I was engrossed from the very first page and wouldn't have been too thrilled with interruptions. It's a testament to Kerry Fisher's writing. The way she draws you in with characters that are so realistic, you expect them to jump off the page any second. I couldn't help getting emotionally invested. Getting utterly lost in the family dynamics, willing some characters on, wanting them to succeed or for some, hoping they'd get their comeuppance. Again, a good thing I was alone as I often muttered some choice words or used rude Italian gestures and that sort of thing just invites strange looks from whomever is sitting next to you.

This story has a lot to offer. Family secrets, skeletons in the closet, complicated relationships with stepchildren and a mother-in-law we wouldn't wish on anyone. But also unlikely friendships and finding your inner strength. The strength to make changes, to stay true to yourself, to find your way through a

strange, new world that feels more like an obstacle course.

There's also humour. Maggie and Beryl had me laughing out loud a number of times. Especially Beryl who has a fabulous no-nonsense attitude and no filter whatsoever.

Sometimes heartbreaking, sometimes funny, always gripping and with a satisfying ending! I loved it!

Beautifully written and heart-wrenching. The ending left tears in my eyes. I was completely engrossed in this book and couldn't stop turning pages. It's a very absorbing story about love and family. **A reminder that the "perfect couple" (you know the one) you envy isn't always as perfect as they seem.** That overly affectionate husband you wish your own would take clues from may be hiding a dark side. *And even though you yourself may be envious of someone else's relationship, just because your own isn't perfect doesn't mean it isn't right.*

This story is told from two perspectives. Maggie has recently married Nico, who lost his first wife to illness. Nico has a teenage daughter, Maggie a younger son. The teenager resents Maggie and doesn't make home life easy. She compares free-spirited Maggie to her fitness obsessed, neat freak mother Caitlyn and finds her lacking. She's not ready to accept her... and it seems the rest of the family isn't quite ready either, including her overbearing grandmother. When Maggie accidentally discovers a secret Caitlyn took to her grave, she is conflicted. Perhaps Nico and his daughter have the right to know, but she doesn't want to ruin the illusion of the perfect wife and mother.

Lara is married to Massimo, Nico's brother. They have a young boy together who takes after his mother more than his athletic father, much to Massimo's disappointment. Massimo is larger than life, charming everyone he meets. Maggie can't help but to think he's mismatched with the quiet, demure Lara... but Lara didn't start out this way. Massimo is quite different with his wife and son behind closed doors.

Lara and Maggie begin to slowly grow closer, despite their differences. A real friendship begins to blossom between them and they become unlikely allies.

This book was originally titled *Secrets of Second Wives*, which led to some confusion on my part. I liked the first title, but *The Silent Wife* fits it to a tee as well.

Kerry Fisher's writing always draws me in from the first page and grips me until the last. I need to clear my schedule before starting one of her books because I know I won't want to put it down.

The Silent Wife is absolutely fabulous! It's about families and the complicated webs that exist within them, about how people lie to protect themselves and others. In *The Silent Wife* (or 'The Secrets of Second Wives' as it was formerly called, and which btw I prefer) Kerry Fisher explores the dynamics of second marriages. She looks at the complicated relationships with step-children, the in-laws, and the regular reminders of the wives/mothers who were first. Told in the alternating voices of Maggie and Lara, this was a poignant story of what women are prepared to go through for their families.

Maggie married Nico after his wife Caitlin died. Nico has a teenage daughter, Francesca, and is part of a seemingly close-knit, well-off Italian family, while Maggie, who grew up on the wrong side of the tracks, has been a single Mum to Sam since his birth, only supported by her no-nonsense mother Beryl, who also brought up Maggie on her own.

Lara married Massimo, Nico's brother, after Massimo's first wife, Dawn, left him. Lara has been a stay-at-home Mum to their shy seven-year-old son, Sandro.

The cracks in this extended family, which is ruled by strong-minded matriarch Anna, soon appear, and while Maggie and Lara establish an unlikely friendship, it becomes harder and harder to sweep family secrets and betrayals under the carpet.

This was the third book by Kerry Fisher that I've read now. While it still made me smile in parts, it had less of the prominent humour I loved in her other books. This one was a lot more sombre, raising awareness of the darker sides of some marriages. It was very good at exploring issues of control and losing control. The characters, as in all Ms Fisher's novels, were so well drawn, you actually have no doubt that they truly exist. There was a nice mix of characters to love and characters to despise. My absolute favourite was Beryl, Maggie's kind and outspoken Mum.

I do love a twisty family drama, one full of secrets and lies that you read with just the slightest tinge of smugness as you can see what is about to happen miles before our poor characters do. But Kerry Fisher always managed to pull something delectably different out of the bag and here she managed to throw a few curveballs, keeping us in our toes right to the very end!

The days of the traditional mum, dad and their 2.4 children have long gone now and family dynamics have changed dramatically due to the extended family. Step-parents are pretty much the norm nowadays so it was rather interesting to see how differently the two second wives coped within their new families. Finding their feet without tripping up over family traditions or trying to live up to wife number one seem to be the constants here although Maggie seems to have a tougher time adjusting to her new role than Lara. But Lara appears to have worse problems within her marriage to contend with.

Kerry Fisher has created a tangled web of lies and indiscretions here with characters that I really came to care about and think of as friends. I took to Maggie, especially, right from the first time we get to meet her at

her wedding to Nico. And when her mum Beryl was introduced into the plot, I realised where Maggie had inherited her strengths of character from and that it would hopefully help her adjust to married life as a second wife and stepmother to a teenage girl. Beryl was hilarious and I think my goal in life now is to be “a bit more Beryl”. Straight talking, forthright and hilarious and always had the perfect story to tell or the perfect treat on hand at just the right time.

Perfectly paced and plotted I loved following this family drama through to it's climatic finale. It was slightly darker than Kerry's other books but still with a subtle but mischievous humour at times. The novel centers around the two sister in-laws, Lara and Maggie, who live next door to each other, with their controlling mother-in-law across the street. One big happy Italian family!

The story opens with the wedding ceremony, Maggie marrying Nico after his wife Caitlin died. Getting on with Nico's 13 year old teenager, Francesca proves to be an on-going battle for Maggie. Maggie will never be as good as her mother! Maggie also brings her own baggage into the equation, being a single mom to her 7 year old son, Sam. Maggie's outspoken mum, Beryl provides much humor and love to the story. Lara married Massimo after Massimo's first wife, Dawn, left him. Lara gave up her career as an accountant, and has been a stay-at-home Mum with their 7 year old timid son, Sandro.

With each chapter titled “Maggie” or “Lara” we are provided with alternating perspectives. The characters are so real I felt I was sitting down at the table or living room with them just listening to their moving emotional story. The story moves along at a fast pace.

But soon the secrets they discover become too much...
