This book is a fast read with lots of characters and an interesting leading character that puzzled me since I don't think I know anyone quite like her. I think it could be made into an interesting movie that teenage girls would love! The author Karen Buley is from Missoula and had told me some of these plot elements years ago so I knew a bit of what to expect when I bought her first novel, Nanny on the Run. I was able to relate in some ways to her main character who goes to work in New York City during the summer of 1977 for a family with two young daughters since I had been a "mother's helper" for a summer on the East Coast when I was in college. I did have a sister who was working closeby that summer so that was a major comfort to me, just as this nanny Bridget has a close friend nearby. But the character and situation of Bridget is different than mine in a few key ways. She is younger, right out of high school. I was almost 20 when I had my similar adventure. I didn't get phone calls from my parents or siblings and received nowhere near the number of letters. The girl I was babysitting was older - 11, not in need of so much personal care, and I was responsible for much more housework. Bridget, the nanny-on-the-run, was brave in so many ways - leaving Butte, MT, at 18 yrs. old for her nanny job, driving in New York City, venturing out into the city on her own or with people she barely knew as comrades, job-hunting in the city. I thought it was remarkable that she had the wherewithal to do those things. I attribute what I felt was her over-reaction to reprimands that she receives from her employer to her being homesick, outside the confines of her comfort zone, and not used to disapproval. She has been taught some strict lessons in manners by her parents and seems shocked that not everyone has the same expectations of their children. I enjoyed trying to imagine what her life had been like in Butte growing up with a loving and religious family but in a seemingly rough community with coarse language, drinking, and the proximity to a house of prostitution. Bridget scoffs at her New York family thinking she's naive, but, in a lot of ways, she is. Her ability to get herself out of a situation that makes her miserable and to deal with several traumatic situations, prove her inner steel.

I need to start by saying that I received this book as a first reads giveaway from Goodreads. However, this has no bearing on my review.

Nanny on the Run is a cute coming of age story about an eighteen year old girl and her experience as a first time nanny. Not only is this Bridget's first job as a nanny, but it is also her first time out of small town Butte, Montana. Her first experience away from Butte lands her in New York City of all places and in the summer of 1977 no less. This, of course, is the summer that the serial killer Son of Sam is terrorizing the city of New York. This severe setting serves as the back drop for Bridget's adventure in baby-sitting. She lands herself a job as a live-in nanny for a well-to-do, snobby couple named Diane and Ethan Thorsen, or shall I say Mr. and Mrs. Thorsen? Bridget has quite a few unique experiences with this clueless couple and their adorably

sweet, yet sometimes monstrous little girls, Adelaide and Hannah. Adelaide is six and a half and Hannah is two and three quarters according to Adelaide; and they are both absolutely precious most of the time. You cannot, however, say the same for the parents, especially their mother. Bridget is finally pushed to the edge during a difficult situation with the family she is working for and is miraculously offered a way out. The only catch is she has to seek refuge from a stranger, a man that she has never met. While this situation is definitely not ideal, the experiences that Bridget has during this summer are almost worth it. This book is a quick read that captures your attention in the beginning and easily keeps it. It's a fun read for readers of all ages and genres.
