Macolino does a superb job constructing a new fantasy world. The details of the various creatures, or races, is very in depth, and the way their villages are described makes one feel as if they are actually there.

Although this is a story that has been told many times, Macolino puts his own unique spin on it. Even adding some interesting new twists to the idea of political corruption and races standing up for what is right. (Which is really timely with the current elections coming up soon in the United States.)

At times this book goes really in depth into what a particular character is doing. While sometimes this is necessary, and it brings more understanding to a character, I didn't think some of the parts were important enough to include in the book. One instance that comes to mind is when Savannah is making dinner for Artimus. I read it in full thinking that there was importance to it since she had been using leaves from a tree that was thought to be extinct, but I couldn't see any.

I read a lot of Urban Fantasy in which the love relationship is just as important as the mission. But I just didn't get into it in this case. I wouldn't say it was filler, but I think it could have been deeper. I wasn't really rooting for their relationship, I wanted to read more about the battles and political intrigue.

Although Artimus is the main character I really would have loved to have it been Irontail, the Centaur. For me, he was much more interesting, and had the most growth. If Macolino does continue writing about this world, I definitely want a lot more of Irontail.

A great beginning for this new world, and Macolino does a fantastic job setting up this book for future

stories. If you enjoy epic fantasy, I highly recommend this one.

Let me first say that going into this book, my expectations were low mainly due to the scary cover combined with the title about death. I saw the vampire-like assassin wondering if he was supposed to be the main character, and being disappointed that he was not a little more hot than scary...and I was seriously wondering if I would ever get over that. The book looked darker than I might normally prefer reading and it seemed like something that my husband might enjoy a little more than me. However, I was intrigued by the mix of adventure, fantasy, and magic in the land of Evorath and I was looking for something different. (Just a side-note I did get over the cover once I figured out which character it was!)

The author has a very concise and meticulous writing style that describes characters and certain situations very thoroughly that helped me to really visualize the characters and what was happening in the plot. I really enjoyed this detail, especially in a new fantasy world where it takes time to learn a new language of characters, magic, and history. It was done very well in a way that I felt like it did not drag on, but was necessary and just enough. The story was in various characters point of view, which helped the reader to gather information from different places which I also liked. I think only once or twice I was confused who was talking, but figured it out pretty quickly. The plot seemed to be very well thought out and had hints of religious undertones, political and societal themes, mixed with a touch of Star Wars. Yes – Star Wars! I liked the movies (but I am definitely not one of those obsessed fans like my brother in law), never read the books, but there was a very clear Yoda reference within. Maybe I am wrong on some of these, but it seemed like there was a ton of themes, hidden messages and other surprises all bundled into one not-too long story. I realize this is just the first book of a series, but there was a lot of information in this first book. I also appreciated the variety of characters, their backgrounds, and the touch of romance story line within. My favorite characters were Tel'Shira, Savannah, and Artimus. The characters were strong, but dynamic and MOST of them were pretty vicious and willing to kick some demon butt! The action was great, and if you enjoy some demon killing with some ruthless bad guys – this book is for you. I do think the action and fighting scenes were some of my favorite in this book.

On to the things I was not so crazy about outside of the scary vampire elf cover! The plot and the characters were very serious in my opinion. Not that humor is always required, but I generally prefer a little bit laced

here and there. There was a very short part of the story which involved the romance which was on the lighter side, but that was a small portion of the entire book. This was seriousness all the time, which made the circumstances seem pretty dire and hopeless at times. That may have been the purpose, but it is just not my preference. This seriousness and focus to get the goal accomplished I think overshadowed some of the characters deeper emotions. I still don't feel connected to any of the characters on a deeper level even by the end of this first book. I am not really invested in any of them – I would be sad and disappointed if they were killed off, but it would not be earth shattering to me at this point.

Overall it was an interesting read, and it was better than my initial expectations. I liked learning about the history of Evorath and its creatures, and the writing itself was excellent. The book was enjoyable, but relative to other books I have read and those that are fantasy – this book was just ok for me. I am not DYING to read the next one, but I might....and I probably will. BUT – I think I am not as intrigued because it is more on the dark-serious side than I normally prefer. At the END of the day, I am glad I read it and I look forward to see what else this author has to offer.

This was a book that I was really drawn to from the front cover and the blurb.

I liked the use of the articles throughout the book, but especially at the beginning. When I first started reading the book, I knew straight away that this was one I would like.

The characters were interesting and easy to relate to. I liked the relationship that formed between Artimus and Savannah, but I think Tel'shira and Casandra were my favourite characters - though I didn't see a lot of Casandra. I would have liked to know a bit more of her history and abilities.

It was also interesting to see the different kinds of races in the world in this book. A lot of them were quite original - and I especially liked the felite. (But then, cats are my favourite animals).

I did struggle a bit to understand the motivations of the main bad guy. Although some parts of the story were from his POV, I still didn't see him as a well-rounded villain.

I felt the fight scenes in particular were really well-written. I could see a lot of the events happening inside my mind and although the action was a little disjointed at times, I felt that worked for the fighting.

I liked the alliances that had formed between the characters by the end of the book. I'd like to see more of the inter-species friendships in later books.

I did notice quite a few errors in the writing, but they didn't really detract from my enjoyment of the story. I was a bit disappointed not to see more of the dryads, too - I was quite intrigued by their role in the whole thing.

At some point in the future, I'd probably read the next book in this series. I cared about what happened to the characters and the world.

I can overlook borrowing of ideas from other authors (mythril; adamantium) as I expect that the intended effect was to try and solidify the authenticity of the world which the author was trying to create. As they come across some dark magic in the caves, Artimus and Savannah cross paths with a centaur named Irontail who is a young warrior. As the threats towards Artimus's own kingdom and those around the forest grows, Savannah takes part in a druid ancient ritual to which they hope will save them all.

What made me say yes to reading this book was the mixture of fantasy and some sort of crime/thriller (I am quite terrible at putting things into specific genres!). I really really wanted to love this book but I didn't. I didn't hate it either. I liked it. So, what, Mrs Moanypants, wasn't to your liking this time, I hear you ask?

That romance mentioned in the blurb in between Artimus and Savannah not only confused me at times but I found it quite unnecessary to the whole story. Why confused? Because they had built a pretty steady foundation for their relationship and then they let the flame die out because the world is in danger, right? When they rekindled it, it was like they didn't know each other at all, again, and I couldn't wrap my head around it. Also, I didn't really get a sense of Artimus 'struggling trying to separate his personal feelings from his responsibilities to the kingdom'. I could not see a big deal as to those two being involved and really, the 'romance' bit is so light and only scratches the surface and didn't really add a 'painpoint' to the whole story.

As for Irontail, the centaur, I wish he would have been the main character. Not alongside Artimus, not alongside the harbinger of Death but in his own true solitary glory. Irontail was by far the bestest, most intriguing character in my eyes. I loved his development from a follower to a leader, his mindset changing from 'this is what I have been told' to 'I can now see through all the lies'.

I found a couple of 'filler' scenes distracting me- Savannah cooking, for a full paragraph. Opening tubs and pots and pans and grinding a flower into powder to make salad dressing. Yeah, that didn't really keep my attention. Another filler paragraph which made my eyes glaze over was when Artimus was dressing up for the battle. In hindsight, however, these laid back filler scenes were a great contrast to the evil and death.

There was perhaps too much happening. So, we have the evil to fight, as per usual. But then there's the romance. And then there's the underground operation pushing for a revolution because the Crown is blind and the people suffering. Yes, it did all tie into a full-bodied story but it took the focus off the villain. I understand that this is a series so all the action I want to see around the changes coming for the elvish Kingdom will probably be in the next book.

Having gotten those niggles off my chest I would like to point out that any story is just better when there are elves involved. I guess if you go into an epic fantasy, elves are a given. The other really interesting characters were the Dryads. The only way I could describe them would be 'forest fairies' except with a lot more ammunition and power than your regular Tinkerbell. I would have liked to have met more of them Dryads. Very intriguing and they have so much more to give to the story...

The world building was mega. I really liked the different 'races'. The lizocks, centaurs, lamia, felites, etc... I always enjoy nature-inspired characters and settings. Kind of woodsy. And the villages for each 'race' were described beautifully.

I also liked the controversial underground 'operation'. Can't really go wrong with people taking it upon themselves to fight the powers that be for justice and equality. So, a slight political tone which I always love. Corruption and over fed 'leaders' always add an element of irritation to the story and as a reader, I always want to see their fall.

I greatly enjoyed Macolino's novel. He creates a world full of many of the typical magical creatures--elves, centaurs, trolls, but also throws in some lesser known races and some creations of his own. Overall, he creates a vivid and lively world that the reader can get lost in. The characters are deep and human, even though many of them aren't technically human. They respond with real human emotions and feel like people you'd like to know. He handles the multiple points of view masterfully. To me character development is the most important part of any novel.
