Juana Inés de Asbaje y Ramírez de Santillana, más conocida como Sor Juana Inés de la Cruz, (San Miguel Nepantla, Nueva España —actualmente México— 12 de noviembre de 1651 - Ciudad de México, 17 de abril de 1695) fue una religiosa católica, poetisa y dramaturga novohispana del Siglo de Oro español. Cultivó la lírica y el teatro, así como la prosa. Por la importancia de su obra, recibió los sobrenombres de el Fénix de América, la Décima Musa o la Décima Musa mexicana.

For a play written by a nun in colonial Mexico in the 17th Century, *Los Empeños de una Casa* is rather decent entertainment. It's not dissimilar in theme from a Shakespearean romance like *As You Like It* or *Taming of the Shrew*, featuring various pairs of fickle lovers (good luck keeping track of who's in love with who) and a snarky-mouthed cross-dressing fool. It's an overdone but typically winning formula.

A note acknowledging my limitations: My Spanish isn't bad, but I *struggled* to make sense of this play's archaic vocabulary and baroque/poetic sentence structure. I felt like I imagine my students used to feel when I unleashed upon them Chaucer and Shakespeare -- frustrated and occasionally helpless. I may have appreciated *Empeños* more if my Spanish were better.

This is a play that is under consideration for the 2017-2018 season at SUNY Sullivan. I have wanted to explore some of the early women playwrights: Sor Juana, Hrosvitha, etc., and our American Identity Season is allowing Sor Juana to come to the forefront, as she is the first American playwright.

This play is very silly, and, I think will be a great classic for community college students. There are a lot of good roles for both young men and women. I am also excited to see a cloak, lantern, sword fight... There are a lot of commedia elements with the two major servants as the traditional Arlecchino and Columbina, so there are some opportunities for training the students in commedia, as well.

I am also looking to produce it with a loa I used to teach. This play was originally produced with a loa to precede it, and I taught one of Sor Juana's loas for three years at Washington State Penitentiary. We'll see...

Like many Golden Age of Spain plays it had very long monologues, but...they seemed well edited and translated by Catherine Boyle.

The students really seemed to love it, and it has such great female/female scenes, for anyone who teaches classical acting...and is looking for more female/female scenes...there's some extraordinary ones in this play...

Ultimately, this play was not chosen, but I adored going down the rabbit hole of Sor Juana's world again, and I hope to one day stage one of her plays.
