Charlie lives in Jackson, Wyoming and has come to stay with his grandparents for the summer. He has his own little cabin which is located directly in front of the Teton Mountains and next to his grandparents' cabin.

Charlie's friend Singing Bird, a Teton Sioux Indian, told him that ravens could cure people. After hearing of this legend, Charlie just had to have a raven for his granddad, who was once a naturalist, had had a heart attack last winter and wasn't getting any better.

So, Charlie climbed up a lodgepole pine tree to a raven's nest and tucked one of the baby ravens into his parka. He named the raven Blue Sky. Charlie took it back to his grandparents' house and began to conduct his "research." Really, he wanted Blue Sky to make his granddad better.

Charlie and Blue Sky began to work out their daily routines, starting with breakfast with his granddad. Blue Sky bonded with Charlie's dad and "imprinted" on Charlie. Now that Charlie's role is the "parent" of Blue Sky, he has many responsibilities, one being collecting enough food for his raven. This kept him and Singing Bird very busy.

In this book, you will discover many unique raven behaviors. Blue Sky even learns to "talk." Learn how Charlie's grandparents' cabin becomes a day care center. You will have to read the book to see how Blue Sky helps Charlie's granddad, and then see if you believe in the raven legend. Charlie learns many lessons from

Blue Sky and his granddad.
