Saying good-bye to a wonderful series is always difficult, so reading *Deceived*, the third book in Irene Hannon's *Private Justice* series was hard. I loved this premise and the characters—I only hope Irene brings them back in another series. One thing we can all count on, thank goodness, is that there is another wonderful series in the wings we can anticipate.

Kate Marshall has mourned the loss of her husband, John, and their son, Kevin, for three long years. A fishing trip gone bad and two empty life vests spelled the end to all her dreams. After a tough period of recovery and a move to St. Louis to start over, Kate has her life more or less back together. Then, running an errand at the mall for a friend, she hears a young voice ask for a poppysicle—Kevin's word for the treat. Looking up at the sound, she sees a boy with wheat blond hair—just like hers and Kevin's. Could it be? Is her son alive?

After fruitlessly searching the mall for the man and boy she saw, she decides to hire Phoenix, Inc., a private investigation firm. Connor Sullivan draws her case and is drawn to her. He agrees to help, even though the police don't think she has any reason to hope. Will he uncover any clues? Will that attraction wax or wane?

Hannon has constructed another complex yarn, with complex characters, and lots of twists and turns that keep you turning pages hours on end. I loved this book as much as I loved the other two in the series, *Vanished* and *Trapped*. You will love *Deceived*, too! Five stars for the book and the series. Get them – now!

Three years ago, Kate Marshall lost both her husband and their four year old son in a boating accident. When she sees a child at the mall who looks like her son, her world is shaken. She wants answers. With her story dismissed by mall security and the local police, Kate turns to the PIs at Phoenix Inc. Connor Sullivan is a former Secret Service agent. When Kate lands in his office with her incredible story, Connor vows to do all

that he can to determine the truth. As his investigation takes him deeper and deeper into the events at the mall, he soon realizes that the accident wasn't really an accident. Will Connor be able to identify the child before something else happens? And is there a chance for a relationship with Kate once everything is over and done?

I think that this was probably my favorite of the entire series. The day I received this one in the mail, I'd also received two others. But this was the one I was the most excited about.

I loved Connor. I've wanted to read his story since he appeared on the pages of Vanished. Of the three PIs, he is my favorite. I loved how he was determined to get to the truth. I also loved how he tried (unsuccessfully) to not fall for Kate. His relationship with his partners was one that captured my attention too. He showed mutual respect for the cases his partners were working and knew they would help him out as they needed to.

I thought that Kate was also really well developed. She's hurting. She's grieving. She really only wants answers. If she gets evidence that the child at the mall isn't her son, she'll let it rest. But if there is the slightest bit of hope, she latches onto it. I thought that her search for answers really showed her emotion. She loved her son. She was falling for Connor. She didn't want to get confused. I also thought that the way that she put her life back together after the accident shows just how strong she was.

I really enjoyed Todd. He's the child that Kate saw at the mall. He doesn't know why his dad has gotten protective of him all of a sudden, but he knows his father loves him. My heart broke a bit for him with all that he'd been through and was going through.

The suspense builds fast in this book. When the puzzle pieces started to fall into place, it really picked up. I found it to be a true page turner.

The suspense was developed at a pace that kept the reader wondering if the villain was truly behind the mystery as he was presented as such a "nice guy." Definitely not the usual suspect.

"*Deceived*" by Irene Hannon is the third enthralling book in the "Private Justice" series and begins three years after Kate Marshall loses her husband and son in a boating accident. Working at a new job in St. Louis, Kate never expects to spot a young boy in the mall who looks a lot like her son whose body was never recovered. With the help of Private Investigator (PI) Connor Sullivan clues begin to emerge that give credibility to Kate's belief that four year old Kevin may have survived the accident.

In a plot that combines mystery, romance and suspense Irene Hannon ramps up the intensity and intrigue as Connor pieces together a puzzle with few clues and only a mother's strong conviction that her husband John would have kept his long held promise to make sure he and Kevin wore life preservers when fishing. In this story you sense Kate's conviction to find out the truth, Connor's dedication to unravel the mystery, and a killer's commitment to protect the child he loves and calls son. It's fast-paced, the action never slowing as events unfold and Connor doggedly works to solve the case, and yet keep his ethical integrity as love between the two blossoms. With clever dexterity Irene Hannon has woven a tale of faith with twists and turns that keep the reader captivated until its explosive conclusion. She sends powerful messages throughout about learning from our experiences, not judging others, trusting in miracles and the power of God working in our lives.

Like the plot the characters are unforgettable, realistic and complex each one dealing with past mistakes and possibilities in an unpredictable future. Kate Marshall, the Director and counsellor at New Start is a kind, level-headed and caring woman who has survived heartbreak and addiction. Connor Sullivan a former Secret Service agent who works as a PI for Phoenix Inc. is assertive, competent, and a listener who instills trust and confidence in his clients. Haunted by guilt from his past, he's determined to be honest, principled and professional in his client-relationship with Kate even as their love grows. Greg Sanders a construction worker who's troubled by the tragic loss of his son and wife is deceptive and paranoid, his fear and bitterness steering his dark decisions. Kevin (aka Todd) a loveable and sweet-natured seven year old is reliant on, and trusts the man he calls father. All these characters and many more add to the power and drama of an exciting and fascinating story you can't put down.

Typical to what we've come to expect from the talents of Irene Hannon, her final novel in her latest (aka my favorite!) series is no let down. Yet, somehow it's creatively new and different. It tells the story of grieving mother, Kate Marshall whose husband died three years ago and though she is operating under the assumption her four-year-old son died in the same boating accident as her husband, Keith's body was never found. When a chance encounter in a busy shopping mall leads her to believe that her son is still alive, Kate employs the help of Phoenix, INC. detective Connor Sullivan in the hopes that she will finally have the answers that have plagued her for years. What neither one of them expected was the web of secrets they'd uncover.

This trilogy has actually been one of my favorites from Irene or really, in this genre period. It's been somehow, indescribably different which is what let it have a voice all its own. One of the funniest bits was the banter between the three partners – Dev, Cal and Connor, even though they all met their better halves much the same way, it doesn't take away the fun of the mystery. Getting back on task with the specifics of Deceived, what I appreciated most was that it wasn't the same kind of edge-of-your-seat suspense as the norm. Hannon managed to find "new" devices to ensure the pages keep turning as opposed to putting someone in danger for a fourth of the book or kidnapping the heroine – a plot "twist" books have relied on one too many times. Instead, wonderfully the danger that does ramp up in the climax doesn't overstay its welcome and does just what it set out to – demands that we keep reading in the late night hours!

Some readers may not enjoy this story as well because it's more information gathering and conversations

than any kind of car-chase-happy action flick you could conjure up, I loved that missing element. One of my biggest pet peeves in suspense novels is the lack of “real” (or appropriate passage of time) one-on-one time with the leading couple who are poised to fall in love. By eliminating that high-action mentality, Irene allowed the reader to revel and enjoy the burgeoning romance between Connor and Kate – there is more depth to the emotional stability of their relationship and realistic believability because of that – plus the ending is darling. Following in the good character traits is the interesting "villain" character; he's more conflicted than most and isn't the stereotypical evil person we've come to expect. Yet another way Irene Hannon's books are anything but ordinary.

If you like suspense novels and if you've been reading this series, you'll enjoy reading Irene Hannon's latest; the final book ends very well and does justice to the series.

Deceived by Irene Hannon has it all - the romance and breath-taking suspense one would expect, but also the kind of rich characterization that is not always found in suspense novels. It's obvious that Deceived is well researched, and Irene also pens a narrative filled with dialogue that swiftly moves the plot along, with exactly the right balance between suspense and romance.

I'm not a big fan of suspense . . . so why do I enjoy Irene's writing so much? In Deceived, the level of suspense is high, but not so much that I'm terrified to read. Painstaking, methodical investigation is highlighted here, which is something I really like. Connor and Kate were able to spend a lot of time together, and it was so enjoyable to watch their feelings for each other develop. Also, while suspense is very much present, the story feels character-driven - and to me, that's what sets Irene's novels apart.

Connor and the male leads from the previous two books, Dev and Cal, formed a private investigation company called the Phoenix Group, using their previous experience to help see that justice is served. All

three make great heroes - not perfect by any means, but strong, dependable, committed to helping, and they know how to laugh. Connor is especially likeable and easy to relate to. I couldn't help but be drawn to Kate - strong, having faced unimaginable losses in her life, and all the stronger for it.

One spiritual theme that stood out to me was the idea of coincidence - or divine appointments, as I often call them. Referring to coincidences, Connor tells Kate, "I like that old saying about them being small miracles in which God chooses to remain anonymous." That's pretty much how I feel, for I suspect that what we are quick to term coincidence is actually something that has God's hand in it.

Irene Hannon has become a "must read" author for me. Although Deceived is book #3 in the Private Justice series, it works well as a standalone story. Highly recommended.

Deceived grabs your attention from the first scenes and doesn't let go. The author does an amazing job of weaving small details together. Three years ago Kate lost her husband and son in a boating accident. Kate sees a boy that looks like it could be her son; his body was never found. The police and mall security think she is just wishful thinking and do not take her seriously. She then reaches out to a PI; enters Phoenix and Connor. Connor is a retired Secret Service agent and is skeptical about her story but willing to do some research.

Secondary characters add dimensions to the story that make it even more special. Pauline is a great friend and a wise woman to give her advice. You always need someone to talk you off the ledge? Nikki is a continuing character from the series and is just hilarious. I was impressed how the author handled Kate's reactions to the development of the case.
