We love Fred! In case you haven't heard, Fred is a five-year-old orphaned math genius who teaches at KITTENS University and lives in his office with his doll, Kingie. He and Kingie sleep under Fred's desk at night. Fred's adventures can occasionally stray into the realm of the silly, but they are imaginatively conceived and perfect for engaging the attention of elementary age children. Furthermore, because Schmidt believes in integrating subjects (as do I), the Fred books offer much more than mathematical knowledge. You and your children will also learn history, astronomy, natural science, interpersonal relations, character qualities, business practices, music, nutrition, language, and more. These do not include drilling of facts, though a specific set of math facts is repeated throughout each book. I recommend adding daily drill to the

Fred books if using them as a stand-alone curriculum (we have another math curriculum). Elementary age is prime time for mastering facts.

I am reading these to my seven- and five-year-old boys as bedtime stories and they are always eager to hear the next chapter. I admit, we do the "Your Turn to Play" questions orally, despite the author's recommendation that the answers be written, but I'm dealing with rather young ones who are still mastering the writing of numbers. I don't want them to catch on that we're "doing math." Their answers reveal the difference between their stages of cognitive development: my five-year-old is not quite Fred-like in his grasp of math. However, the beauty of these books is that they are eminently re-readable. I am seriously considering purchasing the higher level Fred books just as fun supplemental reading for my secondary math students, though I understand they can be used as a stand-alone curriculum.
