The second installment of graphic novel series Toradora!, a romantic comedy adapted from the popular light novel published by ASCII Media Works in Japan, delves deeper into the characters it follows.

Where the first volume introduced the outrageously comedic meeting of Toradora!'s protagonists, high school students Ryuuji Takasu and Taiga Aisaka, volume two focuses less on slapstick punchlines and more on the characters' developing relationship.

In this volume, Taiga decides to confess her feelings to Ryuuji's friend Kitamura without Ryuuji's help – only to have him politely turn her down. Her resulting melancholy turns into a bonding experience when Ryuuji tells her he will remain at her side as her friend: "The only creature mighty enough to stand toe-to-toe with the tiger is the dragon!"

The dialogue in Toradora! #2 is a little strange, probably as a result of its translation into English. It's also a little difficult for English readers to understand some of the puns, especially the tiger and dragon reference: it's a wordplay on "Taiga" sounding like the English word "tiger" and the first character or kanji in Ryuuji's name, which means dragon. When Ryuuji references the tiger and the dragon as equals, he is making a reference to Chinese myth regarding the equality of the two creatures, which often stand for yin and yang in Eastern mythology.

Aside from a somewhat awkward translation, Toradora! #2 comes in on the good side. Zekkyyo's art is cute and fun, able to show Taiga's drastic variety of expressions and highlighting the many different sides of the girl that protagonist Ryuuji sees.

Overall, this volume earns a four out of five for lovely art, an engaging rom-com storyline, and proficient if slightly awkward translation.

To start off, Toradora is about a second-year high school student named Ryuuji Takasu. Because of the thug-looking eyes he was born with, people are constantly scared of him throughout his life, to the point of them giving their wallets when they mistakenly run into him. Following the first day of school, he soon meets the school's most dangerous student, so they call her, whose size is that of a grade schooler, Taiga Aisaka, AKA the "Palm-top Tiger". She has a stare that pierces people to the bone, despite her stature of only about 4 ft.

Perhaps she was the most feared, but when they meet it wasn't a pretty sight. Near the end of the first volume, we learn that these two have a big thing in common, they are in love with each other's best friends! Surprisingly nice Ryuuji, promised that he would help her get closer to his friend, Yuusaka, but in return he had to become her dog servant. (and in time she also would lend him a small hand as well.)

ToraDora's 1st volume also left the story at a cliffhanger, like most first volumes do, an intense excitement was leading to the next. Volume two picks up where Taiga and Ryuuji are confronted about their relatively close relationship, going to school together, talking all day. It got to the point where everyone in school thinks they're dating, when in fact they are plotting together to help each other's love-lives out. Taiga's friend, Minorin Kushieda, along with Ryuuji's friend, Yuusaka Kitamura, congratulates them on their hooking up. Embarrassed and shocked, the two deny everything, unhappy the ones they like were having such misunderstandings. Depression took over as the days passed, Taiga decided that she would put an end to all of the trouble she caused by telling her real feelings. Somethings are said, some hear words they shouldn't have, and Ryuuji ends up telling Taiga that they should stick together and remain friends, as the Tiger and the Dragon. (Taiga is the equivalent English for Tiger in Japanese, and Ryuuji means Dragon in Japanese)

The many misunderstandings undergone through high school is perfectly illustrated in this manga. I loved how the author shows Taiga's vulnerability. Usually she is shown as cruel, cold and uncaring towards others. All her life, she has had a shield to protect herself, to protect her heart. The people around her pretend they understand her just by her innocence looks, but they never do. She actually does have feelings and emotions, the relationship she has with Ryuuji shows this. Ryuuji, naturally a kind-hearted, caring person, sees her softer side and becomes support for the girl. Even from the beginning, he noticed how weak she was on the inside, he wanted to protect her because of it. I think there are a lot of sweet scenes in this volume that strengthens the bonds these two share, showing that people can grow used to each other fairly easy.

I also love the comedy that is included in this story. The fact that the two are connected through each other's friend is hilarious. To think that the two wouldn't have had another reason to know each other, or even approach each other is crazy. They are so compatible, even though the situations might disagree. An example is how Taiga treats Ryuuji. First of all, he gives her dinner every night because she lives alone and doesn't eat anything but fast food, he makes her and himself box lunches for school, and he gives her daily advice on her love-life. And all he gets in return is her constant nagging, her ungratefulness, and her treating him as her personal lap dog. But deep down, Ryuuji can sense her subtle kindness, which is why he can't see himself ever ditching her.

So overall, I believe this was a very enjoyable read. The author, Yuyuko Takemiya, has a very fluent writing style that is easy to understand and holds very important details. All of the characters are relatable and attractive. The artist, Zekkyo, has very nice illustrations that tell the emotions and details excellently. Each scene is realistic even though it is anime. I am looking forward to the volumes to come and hope there are many more surprises! There were many touching moments that had me begging for more, there were funny scenes throughout and the story had a very nice progression. I loved this book!

I'm sure that ya'll remember me babbling about how much I loved the first volume of Toradora 1 (see my review), so I was beyond ecstatic to be able to review the second volume here on the blog.

Story:

Okay, so volume 2 starts off with the biggest misunderstanding...Minori, Taiga's friend, and Takasu, Ryuji's friend, think that Ryuji and Taiga are a couple! Oh, I so knew that was going to happen but even so I burst out giggling because their reactions were absolutely hilarious. Good times.

While I really enjoyed the humor packed into Toradora 2, I felt that this volume didn't really cover any new ground. My biggest hope is that the next volume of Toradora will have more sustenance to the story, and that the two main characters will continue to grow. So nothing earth-shattering happening in the second volume, but it is definitely worth reading simply because it will make you laugh out loud.

Character(s):

I really liked the character development that went on in volume 2 of Toradora.

Artwork:

The artwork hasn't really changed all that much from the first volume to the second, although it does seem like some of the secondary characters had a little more personality and individuality in their depictions in this volume.

While there are not any big changes in the artwork for Toradora 2, it was nice to see that it was consistent with the previous volume and that it did not take a nosedive in quality. So not much to report about the art, but I would just like to add that I absolutely love the panels when the characters seemed to be experiencing a doom spiral since they were just a lot of fun to look at.

Final Verdict: Toradora 2 just as delightfully funny as the first volume.
