She came back to Seattle to find the killer of her friend Coop-he was killed in the previous book by a renegade Kyth. So her whole personality is very abide the rules of the law. Well Sandor is the law for the Kyth...he is the Grand Dame's right hand man. His job is to hunt down the renegades and kill them. The law is very clear-if a Kyth harms humans, they are killed. Well Lena just can't understand Sandor. It drives me nuts that she never once seems to understand that the law has to be that way...the renegades are too dangerous to be amongst the normal human population, and if one were sent to prison, he could feed off the energy there causing untold numbers of deaths. After the death of her mentor and adoptive father, the heroine must make use of her stranger and mostly unwanted powers. In her search she finds the hero and after trailing him for a few days actually outsmarts the immortal by staying one step ahead of him until she's caught. The hero knows who killed her friend and in fact, he's already killed the killer but he can't very well tell the human that the man was a rogue Kyr. But after he witnesses the heroine powers it's clear that though she's human in most aspects, she's also a member of his race. They begin a affair quite quickly and the speed in which they leapt into bed together put me off a bit. But it's only after the sleep together that the heroine touches the hero's magical tattoo and sees the death of her friend and the events afterward for herself. She's feels betrayed by the hero but in typical over dramatic female fashion, all she cares about is the fact that her new lover is a murderer. I can't stand stupid ignorant characters and the heroine certain was that. I loved the first book in this series - Dark Warrior Unleashed. And I was looking forward to more of the same with this 2nd entry in Morgan's Talions series, but I came away feeling disappointed and cheated.

This is Sandor Kearns and Lena Wilson's story. Sandor is the Chief Enforcer of the Talions, what I would equate with the "chief of police" position. It is his job to take out renegade Kyth and keep their people a secret from society. I never really got a good feel for his personality, other than being dark, broody and ready to fight.

Lena Wilson is his love interest. She has some unique talents. Grand Dame Kerry and Sandor both believe she has some Kyth ancestry yet Lena vehemently denies it and except for this one scene, you never hear anything else about her heritage. Lena is also slightly TSTL and manages to get herself hurt on one occasion because she refuses to listen. She comes across as a know-it-all and a little bit self righteous.

I never felt the romance between these two really clicked. They are hot for each other. Now she is mad at him. Now she's forgiven him. Now he's mad at her. Whatever!

The only bright spots in this book are the continuing scenes with Grand Dame Kerry and her Consort/Husband Ranulf; the introduction of Tara, who has abilities similar to Kerry and a new man on the scene - Grey Danby, who I believe will be the next "hero" in this series. If not for that bright spot I believe I would give up this series after reading this disappointing entry.
