It is testimony to Chan's writing style that he has been able to make what is essentially an "all you need to know" book so readable on a Sunday afternoon. What makes this book so helpful is the number of angles that Chan approaches the topic. Starting with the biblical and theological essentials on what defines evangelism, Chan is also adept at helping us look at evangelism with an historical, social, missional, contemporary and personal framework.

His skill of reading widely and summarising well means that these different angles are supported by references from John Chapman, Tim Keller and Graeme Cole as well as insights from cross cultural missionaries, observations by secular observers of our culture and stories from his real life.

I found the chapter on the differences between evangelising in the "modern" and "post modern" eras very helpful. It helped me personally think of new ways to engage my angry post modern friends.

There are helpful chapters about how to deliver public talks to a secular crowd, but also how to engage in conversations in quieter one to one settings. I think this makes it a book that encourages believers of all personalities to think how we can speak the great news about Christ. It's a reference book I will return to and highly recommend it to be on the shelf of all believers who love a good read.

Sam Chan's book, *Evangelism in a Skeptical World*, is a thoughtful and practical guide to evangelism within the context of this postmodern world. He first details prevalent cultural assumptions and worldviews before moving on to discuss the concept of the Gospel and the definition of evangelism. At both the start and the finish of this work, he also discusses ontology and epistemology, describing the factors that play into a person's belief or doubt.

Throughout the course of the book, Chan presents many models and theories of evangelism that have been developed by other individuals or organizations. He also describes his own philosophy and practice of evangelism, wishing primarily to create a helpful resource rather than dictate a certain method. While he talks a bit about one-on-one street evangelism, his primary focus is on relational evangelism and Gospel-focused sermons. He sees a great deal of value in building foundational trust and common ground, inviting

people into Gospel community, listening to their story, all while sharing our own testimony and the Gospel narrative.

Chan shows how to craft a Gospel presentation appropriate for any particular situation or cultural context. He stresses the importance of contextualizing while presenting the Gospel, saying that one must be aware of the Biblical context, his own context, and his audience's context. In many instances, he gives step by step guidance on how to use one framework to guide evangelism within several difference contexts. Crafting the Gospel to be received by a specific audience requires creativity and storytelling skill. Chan lays out many strategies for identifying a culture's intrinsic redemptive analogies and existential cry, and using these facets of general revelation to share the special revelation of Christ.

While it is not strictly an academic text, the use of specific theological terms, philosophies, theologians, and historical events may make it a more challenging read for those who are not already familiar with this field of study. Many footnotes fill the bottom of these pages, including citations, explanatory notes, and mentions of those people who particularly influenced or inspired Chan with ideas and concepts for this work. He is supported by a large volume of quotations from other prominent theologians and scholars, as well as Scriptural references and examples. Each chapter's conclusion features a helpful recap of that section and includes resources for further reading. An appendix provides an overview of a key evangelism method.

Full to the brim with wisdom, strategies, charts and graphs, and examples, this book does not merely advise believers to storytell, it beautifully exemplifies teaching through storytelling on every page.
