Synopsis: Serpent Tide takes place in coastal South Carolina. Wesley Vandergrift the son of billionaire Imogene Vandergrift, is unhappy living the life he's living. His mother, spoils Wesley to the point where he not only has no real idea of what real life is all about, but he's also miserable. He wants nothing more than to be like other kids. Wesley's only real friend is young Amanda, whose mother, Maria, had been taking care of Wesley since infancy. And although they come from different sides of the tracks. Wesley and Amanda have one thing in common – their fascination with Jack Mackey, "The Snake Stalker." Together they watch the Australian track down all kinds of serpents, reveling in his adventures and wishing they could be there with him. Then one day Wesley's life changes. Review: I liked this book a lot is was very easy to read. It had a very complex plot which is why I liked it. I like the general story and like all the action and adventure in it. I would recommend this book to junior high aged kids as well as High School students.

It's an interesting read, certainly. I wouldn't call it exciting, exactly. It's got conflict coming out of its ears, but there's really three problems:

1. The romance line between Maggie and Jack is a little on the thin side. They get together without anything more than just chemistry, and anything that would typically be "relationship-building," like getting to know each other, is all in the implied backstory. From when Jack was married to Maggie's now-deceased sister, Nicole. Normally, I wouldn't really have a problem with this, but then they decide very suddenly to get

engaged. They don't really catch up with each other, they don't have more than one date, they only really have great chemistry. And a shared love for Nicole. (I'm sorry, to me that's just weird. I don't have a sister, but if I did and she died, I wouldn't even be looking at her husband like that. It would just be too weird. And yes, that's a personal thing.)

2. Wesley doesn't feel real to me. Wesley is the main character, and he's always being rescued. He's proactive, to a point. He has agency, to a point. But in the end, he's always being rescued. He had one incident where he actually escaped--and we don't see any of it, we're only told about it later. And yes, the first situation in the book he's as proactive as he can be, and the last he's very limited by the circumstances--but it's still disappointing. He's the main character, and I expect him to solve more of his own problems, rather than wait for an adult to do it for him. He also has some very calm reactions that don't feel real at all. He's just found out the rather earth-shattering (to a 12-year-old) thing--his mother isn't really his mother at all, and instead his father is a world-famous TV star! And he takes it really, really calmly. He doesn't feel any kind of anger, or hatred, or confusion until the end, when he hates Imogene for possibly drowning his father. And maybe hatred would have been strong before, but why isn't he angry at her for lying to him? For that matter, why does he trust Jack instantly? Sure, Jack's his father and a TV star, but you shouldn't launch yourself into a hug with someone you just met. Most kids would probably freeze up, not do that.

3. The author is preachy. Now, I know theme is important to a book. But when the author is including lines about how Wesley remembered how caged he felt as a rich kid, and now he's glad his parents make him pick up after himself (paraphrased, but part of the ending chapter of *Serpent Tide*), it's no longer theme: It's being shoved in your face. I don't need you to tell me how grateful I should be to have grown up normal, or how grateful I should be to my parents, which is what this feels like. I'm grateful to them without the author's help. And kids may not realize they should be grateful to their parents, but preaching at them won't help with that. The author needs to try harder to incorporate the theme into the actual plot, if that was the theme she was aiming at.

And yet, Fogg spins an entertaining tale, which is why I've read it as many times as I have. I've also read the other two books (once each, a long time ago), and they're also entertaining. I'm actually a bit disappointed that she's written nothing else, because I want to see if she's improved on these things and see what other stories she has in her.

This is very fun book with creative twists and suspenseful turns. It was written by an LDS author, and though it is not considered LDS fiction, a couple of the characters are Mormon, so there is some church talk in it. All in all I thought it was a great book.

Poor rich-kid Wesley suffers from an over-protective mother, a case of aqua-phobia, and bullies at school. When Wesley begins to suspect that his mother Imogene may not be his real mother, the evidence begins to point to the conclusion that Jack Mackey, TV's famous Snake Stalker, is his real father.

As a result, Wesley's once-pedantic life turns into a wild adventure as he searches for the truth about his

origins and learns that Imogene isn't just eccentric, but dangerous and evil.

Written for middle-grade, Serpent Tide should appeal to the worries children feel at that age, as well as their sense of adventure. There are some 'fantasy revelations' (i.e., that Wesley is the son of the famous Jack Mackey) and several unbelievable events which make the story contrived--but since it's geared for younger kids, it doesn't have to make complete sense.

The plot is straightforward and moves along at a steady clip, with well-paced action. However, none of the action is gory or too scary for kids, although the main characters' lives are imperiled by the end.

An interesting aspect to this story are the moral dilemmas of the characters. Should Wesley feel guilt about leaving a woman who's 'mothered' him for 10+ years? Should Imogene's illegal immigrant housekeeper tell Wesley the truth about his origins? How can Jack get over the death of his wife when he feels it was his fault? Those were interesting things to discuss with my eight-year-old daughter as I read this story to her.

The main characters are fun and engaging, although Fogg doesn't go particularly deep with them. The only character I felt particularly interested in was Jack, and that was mostly because Fogg realistically portrayed the pain he felt from the loss of his wife/child, and then his son's sudden reappearance.

Wesley was only mildly more interesting as a character, as you watch him change into the person he knows he can become when he's no longer suffocating under Imogene's influence.

Imogene was deliciously evil, and I liked that Fogg does explain her motives so even though she's a strange character to us, we understand where she's coming from.

My main complaints are that Fogg uses some big words that middle-readers wouldn't know, and some of her writing kind of hits you over the head saying, "Look at this, duh." So it's not exactly subtle, but that's an adult's perspective, and most children won't care.
