Because of Kayla's artistic ability, her jaded art teacher assigns Kayla to oversee a hand-picked — weeded out? — class of misfits paint a mural on an exterior wall of their school.

Among the selected muralists is Zach, a surprisingly polite drummer in a death metal band — Maximum Whack. The moment he speaks to Kayla she is captivated by the color of his voice.

Yes, the "color" of his voice.

Not only is Kayla artistic, but also she has a somewhat unusual condition called synesthesia. She sees sounds as colors. How cool is that?

Zach's voice is a vivid violet. Wow.

Despite loud metal music, questionable fun in The Bottomless Pit mud, and a less-than-exciting visit to a museum, Kayla develops an interest in Zach.

That's only what you'd expect, eh b'ys?

Artsy Girl addresses this troublesome moral question: "Is it cheating to slightly doctor a photo before it is entered in a photography contest?"
