Stars and Scorpions is a fantastic addition to the After Eden series. Austin Dragon has picked up where he left off, but writing the next part to story that is both explosive and terrifying. By that I mean, the action sequences move at a break-neck speed and keep you on the edge of your seat, while the story itself terrifies me because of how the majority (if not all) of it could come to pass. As with the previous book, Austin does

a great job of taking our true historical events and blending them into a future that is in the realm of possibility.

Book 2 in this series picks up where book 1 ended and shows the Jewish people's (the Stars) response to the current world governments towards religion, and the primarily Mexican Catholics (the Scorpions) fight to take back their country from the drug cartels and corrupt government. There are more great characters introduced in this book and I am especially fond of Father Marcos. He's been my clear favorite so far in the series due to his stance and the way he treats people. There have been plenty of characters in this series that are great to root for and villains that you'll love to hate, but Father Marcos still is at the top for me.

My very favorite thing about this series hasn't changed, though. I said it with book 1 and the same holds true for book 2, Austin does an amazing job of weaving together plot points. It's like he's holding several timelines in his hand and can see clearly where they will intersect and where they will diverge again. Sometimes I'll be reading a section in the book and wonder what Austin is doing with that particular plot point, but then I'll read further and everything comes together and makes sense. There are no loose ends or unfinished thoughts with this series. The way he weaves it all together still amazes me.

In summary, this is an excellent addition to the After Eden series. If you have already read Thy Kingdom Fall (book 1) and enjoyed it, you're going to love this one as well. I would recommend reading book 1 first, though. I think you could probably start with this book if you wanted, but some of the plot elements will just make more sense with the background book 1 provides. Plus, I just couldn't imagine missing any of the story in this series. It's that good!

Stars and Scorpions is the second book in the After Eden series. While this is part of the series it can be read as a standalone, though it is clearly not the end of the storyline. There is violence.

Be aware of the political and religious topics that are in this book and series. Also realize that this book was published in January 2014, long before the current political climate around the world. Enjoy Stars and Scorpions for the well written FICTIONAL book it is. Could this possibly be the world in another 70 years? Yes it could be. But we could just as easily be living on the moon or Mars by then too.

The book blurb adequately describes the storyline so I'm not going to repeat all of that info here. The author did a good job of giving readers an overview of what this book and series is and will be about. Much of the book is set in the late 21st century and the world is, in some ways, radically different from our world today. Tek and drugs are almost everywhere in the United States, especially in the major cities.

Some readers will find the format of this book confusing due to all the multiple viewpoints and the back and forth on the timelines. But if you pay attention to the headings (which tell you the date, time, location) you will be fine and keep track of the storylines. This is definitely a series that I will keep reading!

Review: STARS AND SCORPIONS (AFTER EDEN BOOK TWO) by Austin Dragon

If you've read Book One of the AFTER EDEN series, you are already familiar with the wide-ranging imagination of Author Austin Dragon, of the unexpected paths it takes, and the very frightening future it purports. If you've not yet read THY KINGDOM FALL, you can enter STARS AND SCORPIONS and still understand it; but I would suggest reading in order if at all possible.

This series, which could be categorized as DYSTOPIAN in all capitals, always puts me in mind of the Dystopian "In the Year 2525" (Zager & Evans, 1969) and of Dante's proscription, "Abandon hope, all ye who enter here." Deliver us from the type of society presented in this series.

DRAGON SCORES AGAIN! Book #1 of this series, 'Thy Kingdom Fall,' provides background and sets the stage for an all too possible future where Government uses all means available to secularize the United States of America, removing religious obstacles to exercise of total power. Book #2 in the series, 'Stars and Scorpions,' focuses on efforts by followers of Judaism (Stars) and those of Catholicism as practiced in Mexico (Scorpions), to defend their faiths against external pressures: attacks against Judaism by the government of the USA; attacks against Catholics by the drug cartels and corrupt government of Mexico. It is not difficult to choose a side in these running conflicts, but Dragon set the hook with Book #1 and he keeps the line taught throughout Book #2. I tried to put Book #1 down more than once but always picked it back up. There was never a question about Book #2. AND, lurking in the shadows – but always probing – is the Islamic Caliphate sitting atop all of Europe, the Middle East, and parts of Asia and Africa. Their goal is world domination. World War III is coming.
