In (sometimes re-)reading DC Comics/Paradox Press' Big Books Of . . . series, I've determined that, at least so far, Doug Moench's two entries—The Big Book of Conspiracies and this entry, The Big Book of the Unexplained—have been among the best, if not the outright best, of them all. Some of this is Moench's narrative skill that carries over from other areas, but some of this may well be that the subject matter lends itself best to The Big Books Of's format. Given the by-definition speculative nature of both *Conspiracies* and *the Unexplained*, the artists' imaginations are free to run wild, and with Moench's guiding hand, *the Unexplained* is a fun read.

While not quite as good as *The Big Book of Conspiracies*, if only because the focus of the subject matter is necessarily looser, *The Big Book of the Unexplained* delves into any number of subject matters, from cryptozoology to UFOs, and it takes the tack laid out in Rev. Ivan Stang's introduction to the first volume that we should all maintain a healthy dose of skepticism in *everything*, whether the official story or the "secret history". That Moench has an extensive, broad bibliography is compelling as well, and helps with the overall tone of *The Big Book of the Unexplained*. (Indeed, I've picked up a few ideas for other reading from Moench's bibliography.)

That said, *The Big Book of the Unexplained* is generally a very good volume; where it rises above basic treatment of the subject matter is that it critically analyzes these unexplained issues. Moench utilizes a healthy dose of skepticism in his own writing, but ultimately he allows the reader to come to their own conclusions. In general, worthwhile, fun, and educational.
