This book by Pastor Erwin McManus is intended to ignite the passion inside of us to chase God's dream for our lives. For the most part it follows the story of the Old Testament character of Jonathan as he examines what it looks like to allow ourselves to fall forwards in to God's plan and purpose despite our fears and inhibitions. It also overlays a fictional story that follows the chapters through the journey, something that allows the thematic elements to tell a story of sorts along the way.

McManus is certainly a fan of stories. He is a visionary and an imaginative thinker at his core, and the way he processes allows the stories of his own life and Church to transfer in to a picture of immense possibilities for all of us. It is an effective way of thinking and writing that should connect with those who think similarly. He might lose some along the way though, especially those who are looking for something incredibly practical, and straight forward. That's not to say he doesn't present some very clear ideas, simply that he weaves them through a desire to simply help us ponder and think about the "what ifs". Perhaps the most practical components here surface near the end when he deals with the subject of prayer. It is here when he takes the tone up a notch and speaks of the difference between being faithful and being or acting in "faith". Of living a life full of potential versus being willing to step out and actually live out that potential on the other side.

Throughout this book we get a very good picture of the passion this pastor has for His Church, and THE Church. He is very much grounded in his own experience and learnings of how God led his early pastorate and a dysfunctional Church community to become one of the leading Churches of our current day. He insists repeatedly that the success of his Church is grounded in one thing, a willingness to be faithful even when growth or success wasn't happening. One of the markers of this community that he pastors is the large proportion of missionaries. This is particularly unusual, as he points out, because Church growth is often concerned with retaining rather than equipping and sending. And yet here is a community that lives and breathes active faith to such a degree that a huge number of their congregation don't even stick around.

The book did lose me in points. There were almost too many stories actually. But I did enjoy the spirit and the concept of it. And that is perhaps what it leaves you with more than anything, is an inspiring concept that is intended to get you thinking and moving in your own life. I don't know that it left me with any concrete, practical ideas, but it did expose a need in my life to come face to face with my own fears. And it certainly begged me to ask the question of whether I am living my life in such a way that when others see me they see God. And if this read can move me forward in examining that part of my life with sincerity, to me that is worth it.
