As always, Lohmann gives readers characters who feel genuine and that is a major reason why I enjoyed this book. Though sold under the Superromance line, this book really felt more like a mainstream novel that has strong romantic elements.

The main plot in this book involves the investigation into the brutal murder of an elderly woman. Detective Howie Berry knew her as a frequent tipster who called the Durham P.D. every Wednesday morning. However, to Julianne Dawson, she was her beloved Aunt Binnie.

There's definitely plenty of interest between Howie and Julianne, though mostly on Howie's part at first. The romance takes a distant back seat to the police procedure for most of the book, though. Howie has to keep a certain distance because of Julianne's proximity to the investigation. After all, her cousin and her brother are both prime suspects. The weight of history doesn't help either. Julianne comes from a very prominent tobacco family while Howie grew up poor and on the wrong side of the tracks.

I enjoy a good mystery, so I dug right in as Howie navigated the rules of police procedure and the mores of local society. The action isn't heart-pounding, edge of your seat stuff but it did give me an appreciation for how police do their work. There are some odd little gaps in the plot (like the overstated creepiness of a character we never actually meet), but I enjoyed the book enough to mostly overlook these.

I also liked Howie and Julianne. They're not dramatic but they learn how to communicate with each other. They become a team over the course of the story and when they finally got together, I was happy for them.

Interesting story about a murder investigation in a southern town in North Carolina, where the prominent family of the region, has not only lost a family member, but it seems that one of them might be the murderer. The focus of the story is in the intricate investigation, where everyone is connected to someone, all the leads are taking towards the same conclusion, but the conclusion is the one, that can destroy everything else developing around the characters.

The attraction between Howie and Julianne is immediate, and definitely inappropriate. Her family member is murdered, by someone in her family, and he is the investigating detective. Not possible in any way. And when you take into consideration their society beyond the investigation, would Howie be admitted to the inner circles anyway.

The relationship starts to form, regardless, through long phone conversations, and accidental meetings around the town.

The investigation is not moving forward, everyone 'knows' who did it, but proving it is another matter.

The matter is interesting, and the story has beauty in it, and is well written. It does move forward in a crawling pace at times, but is not a story to be given up on

While the title suggests a standard contemporary romance, this book is so much more. The murder of Julianne Dawson's beloved Aunt Binnie begins her journey through the investigation to find and arrest the killer. She suspects her own brother, but the thought that a member of her own family could do such a thing is abhorrent. So is the thought that Aunt Binnie's murder will go unsolved as had her Uncle Winston's, decades earlier.

Enter Detective Howie Berry, whose connection with Julianne's family when it owned and ran several major businesses in Durham, does not go unnoticed by him. After all, his mother was one of the mill workers. His father's connection with the plant is not so obvious, because he was one of the executives who denied Howie his fatherly presence until after Howie was an adult and even then, from a distance.

When Howie suspects Julianne's brother, he also suspects he's falling for Julianne, but he can't act on those feelings. Nor can she--unless she no longer cares to catch the criminal, and Howie can't let that happen. His job is to put murderers behind bars and when the killer confesses, the barriers that prevent Howie and Julianne from exploring their feelings for each other remain in place--until each decide to take a chance. But how will her mother and his father react? What about the other family members? And how will even a confession affect the new business Julianne is starting in the new tech-oriented Durham? A suspenseful story worth spending time with.
