Of course, there is a little something-something going on with Frank and Nessa, but it seems to work.

A strange looking professor shows up at Em's back door wanting to rent her furnace to try out some gem heating techniques he's read about. And that is where things get strange!

Allison comes back, having made her peace with Ireland and her mother's death years before, only to find no one has heard from Cam. So being the good sister, Em talks to her boyfriend, the sheriff Matt, and one thing leads to another, between Cam being missing and the strange professor, Denis, Em and Frank and knee-deep in a mystery that somehow leads them to a dead body in the desert! All in the line of duty for a glass-blowing sleuth!

This story was well-written, kept me entertained and guess at the killer until the very end. I loved learning more about the characters, and I really love the glassblowing information and tidbits. Also in this, there were added gem tidbits, that were fun and interesting.

When Cam disappears and a body is found in the desert with stones in his pocket, Em begins to investigate with the help of Allison's uncle and her boyfriend, the chief of police. The Gem Show, an Indian reservation with a peridot reserve, and a little bit of glassblowing all play a role in the mystery. Each chapter provides a tidbit on gems. This was a nice conclusion to the series.

The above points were the main reason I finished the book. I thought that the story was excessively long and that the pacing was much too slow. It felt like it took FOREVER for the story to actually start and there were times I thought about chucking the book instead of waiting. Once it did start, it was pretty good.

A few of my small pet peeves about the writing:

1) Character constantly came together to summarize the clues that they had found so far and I thought that really slowed down the story and didn't give the reader enough credit. I read lots of mysteries. I don't need a constant reminder of the clues thus far.

2) There was an overuse of "Em" the main character's nickname. It felt forced and tedious at times when characters kept unnecessarily using her name in dialogue.

Overall a so so book. I can't say I would recommend it but it wasn't a wasted read either.
