I admit that I don't read many books that fall into the inspirational category. I like to be entertained and escape reality when I read. I like to escape motherhood and responsibilities. It is what I like to do, but not necessarily what I really need to do.

I fall into the traps that *Lifestyles of the Great & Spacious* is all about. There is a quote from page 104 that to me had great significance. "Not only does God care about what we do, he cares about us. What we do is what we become, and he wants us to become like him."

For a long time I have balked at having a study journal. I didn't want to do it. But I found some very noteworthy precepts in this book. I was writing study notes in the margins and decided that maybe it would be a good idea to have a central place where I put all the notes, instead of trying to remember what book I found an idea and then hunting it down again.

John Bytheway does an excellent job of explaining the gospel in a down to earth way. He is clear and concise. He shows how personal and individual the gospel is. Heavenly Father loves everyone, regardless of their feelings for Him. The scoffers and scorners of the Great and Spacious Building are also His children.

I enjoyed this book and know that I need to seek out more like it.

This was my first taste of Mr. Bytheway's work and looks like it won't be my last! This latest in his series of

scripture commentaries was a treat. This one focused on Lehi's dream found in 1 Nephi 8:4-35 from the Book of Mormon. For those not familiar with this scripture, in summary it is about Lehi's (a prophet in the Americas, about 600 B.C.) vision of the tree of life where he partakes of its fruit and desires his family to do likewise. In this dream he sees a rod of iron, a strait and narrow path, the mists of darkness that enshroud men, and the ominous great and spacious building (see book cover for artist rendition). The author described the rod of iron as the guide/guard rail in the strait and narrow path that leads to the tree of life. Whereas the mists of darkness was blindness to the path but subject to the mocking of those in the great and spacious building who swayed travelers away from the strait and narrow.

Breaking the scriptures down to few verses at a time, we find the author's "thoughts, insights, and observations". This made for a concise and thoughtful presentation of the meaning that can be found in what the author pointed out about Lehi's dream as have been called the "parable of the paths", comparable to Jesus' "parable of the four kinds of soil" found in Matthew 13 from the Holy Bible. Hence, the dream was an illustration of ones choices to a path of life ... (1) Start the narrow path, overcome by the mists, get lost, (2) Start the narrow path, partake of the fruit, be ashamed, wander off, get lost, (3) Start the narrow path, hold fast, partake of the fruit, stay, or (4) No interest in the strait and narrow, move directly toward the building.

The last two chapters tipped the star rating to the top for me. Up to that point, the author went into laying out Lehi's dream and explanations. Now the author concludes with what the people in the great and spacious building could be saying to those in the path today (like, "You're an overzealous fanatic.", "Why are you trying to convert people?", or "You think you're better than us.") and how to "heed-not" to the scoffing and answer with the Savior in mind. Love it! Overall, I gained understanding from the wealth of information and wise counsels and felt the truthfulness in those words.

Excellent book! A great tool for ponder and study. I could also see myself using excerpts from this book should I ever give a "talk" (lesson speech) regarding "agency".

My friend, Jill, loaned me this little book and it was quite an easy read and some good things to ponder. I have been reading another book with another friend on Lehi's Dream/Nephi's Vision which is much more complex but that book helped me see things in this one.

As always BTW writes for the younger set but there are things to be gleaned by adults. The one part that grabbed my attention was the comments we make while we are in the Great and Spacious....that points out just how much IN we really are, no matter how much we think we aren't. And the comment about looking down on people, making judgements, etc. But there was this one quote about how we DO make judgements and how to do it correct was very much in my way of thinking. It's too easy to quote the "judge not" scripture and act like any judgement is wrong. When in fact, we make judgements all the time....important in that is

that we judge something, not some one. We are not to make eternal judgements...that is not our role. But we most certainly need to ascertain what is good and what is not good for us.

And then the subtitle caught my eye: "Finding your Path in Lehi's Dream." Since one of my focuses this year is to really delve into the scriptures and into gospel study and find more ways to really wrap my life around being more, this book fit right into it.

I love symbolism and love exploring the deeper meanings of things. I'm a "there's always more to the story" kind of woman and I always have been. We know well that Lehi's dream was deeply symbolic and we learn quite a bit more about it from Nephi and the angel who visited him when he asked to know more. Since I haven't had any angelic messengers show up lately to interpret scripture for me, I clearly need to do my own studying. And this book was definitely enlightening.

I have always enjoyed John Bytheway's writing style. It's very clear and straightforward with just enough humor to keep me engaged. Lifestyles of the Great and Spacious goes through Lehi's dream verse by verse, explaining and analyzing the dream to help us understand what Lehi was really seeing and what all of the elements meant, as well as putting them in context to Lehi's knowledge and culture and to gospel principles. And each analysis is followed up with helps for applying these teachings and principles in our own lives today.

I admit I read this book straight through—it's how I read most books the first time—but now that I've read it I will be going back through and re-reading more thoroughly and slowly, along with my scripture study, to really gain the maximum benefit. The book also contains an appendix with a quick commentary/summary of each verse. I think that will be helpful when I want to go back and study different principles. It also has a complete bibliography of sources cited in the book so you can study even more deeply should you desire.

Don't be fooled by the small size of this book. I was, having not read Brother Bytheway's previous commentaries. It is absolutely packed FULL of learning and insight. One of my favorite parts of the book comes at the end of the first chapter when he talks about how the Book of Mormon isn't the story of a perfect gospel family and how Nephi and his brothers might even be somewhat dysfunctional . He goes on to say, "We can only imagine how thrilled Sariah must be to have an account of her family's problems published among all nations, kindreds, tongues, and peoples." Kind of makes my little family issues not seem like such a big deal. It was just what I needed to hear to press on.
