Wow, I've never read (or heard of) a yeti shifter story before. And this one appears to be the author's first published piece—a very effective and ambitious work-around the story prompt submitted. Special props for not always taking the easy road with its main characters.

Rohn is disabled from a horrible car accident that also took the life of his lover. Rohn is still dealing with the disfigurement to his body and the guilt over being the one behind the wheel. He takes himself to the wilds of Alaska to get away from it all—that is, seeking something more to his life—and ends up with a wilderness adventure that makes him reevaluate it all. Considering his privileged spoon-in-mouth trust fund upbringing, it's interesting how easily Rohn takes to roughing it. He refuses to see himself as disabled, as a victim.

Jrake (Jake??) believes he is the last of his kind, the last yeti-shifter. Lonely and alone, his life in the wilds necessitates his living mostly in his yeti form. Despite being familiar with humans and their ways, he is not at all comfortable with that side of his nature. He holds humans responsible for many of the evils in the world. How the author will get these two disparate characters to see eye-to eye is what kept me reading.

I liked how Rohn and Jrake learned about themselves as they learned about each other. Both of them are drawn well within their fantasy world. The story is told fairly extensively through narrative... a necessity at times, a bit too much at others. And, it was very quick, the falling in love part, done over a period of a just a few days (two?). But this is paranormal, after all, and anything can happen. Congrats to the author on a promising start. I hope there's much more to come!

The Last Yeti by Tully Vincent is already on my “favorite shelf” because it was one of the few books I really felt lately. I was very curious about this story when it came out in the Love is an Open Road event on the MM group on Goodreads. For different reasons: first of all I had never read about a yeti shifter before so I was intrigued by this new world and how would have been shown by the author. Then, have you seen the cover? It alone deserves all the stars. I can anticipate to you that the story exceeded my expectations, not only from the writing part but especially in the emotional side. In fact I was caught in the story from the start, but what surprised me more was the pull I felt from both MCs, I was soon there in their lives and empathize with them. I felt them hurting and loving. In my opinion the author made an amazing work at characterizing Rohn and Jrake and leaving nothing unexplored.

Rohn is still mourning the loss of his life partner, Evan, dead two years ago in the same accident that took his right arm and his painter career too. Still recovering from an alcohol abuse, Rohn thinks to be a failure to everyone, to his dad who wants him to be his business’ heir. To Evan for letting him die in the accident. Now that he can’t draw anymore without his right arm, he’s a failure to himself too. Tired of feeling helpless and to be always babysat, he has come to Alaska to show his dad and himself too that he can take care of himself.

Jrake is a yeti shifter. Desperate in his researches of another yeti, he is almost resigned to the fate of being the last yeti in the world when he smell another of his kind just in Alaska, his home country, but he can’t find it. His coldness versus the human world led him to live a life mainly in his preferred form, the yeti one, alone and far away from the humans. When he first met Rohn I admit it was a little hard to watch him to be so indifferent at the beginning, before he saves Rohn from dying in the iced river, even if he should have let him go and die since Rohn saw him as a yeti. Jrake is tired of being alone but he is so used to push his human side aside, it’s not easy to thrust and let him find a closeness with the man who came into his world unexpected.

The story is heartbroken, sweet and emotional. It is detailed and never once shallow about Jrake and his yeti world. Everything is well explained, I followed him in his hunting, fishing and shifting. I particularly liked The Last Yeti is not the usual shifter story about destined mates I’m used to read, on the contrary, Jrake isn’t really looking, not even hoping, for a partner.

The writing style is my favorite, with two different POV, the use of the third person past. It made the reading quick and the words flew easily and there was never a pause in the story. Behind their meeting and spending time together there is a lot going on around the MCs.

Moreover I liked the story a lot cause I was able to see every little thing in my head. There are some parts that are so evocative. Plus, the sex scenes are hot and sexy just as I like them to be. I loved the ending part but I loved more to know that there is a WIP sequel already. I can’t wait to see them together and to know how they will be able to live their lives as a couple, I’m hungry for more. Well done!

A truly affecting tale with a unique spin.

Jrake is a yeti shifter, his kind naturally self isolating as they covet their independence and freedom. Despite choosing to be mostly solitary, he does admit to the sporadic feelings of loneliness, made worse when he realizes he just might be the last of his kind. Though Jrake can shift into human form, he rarely does so, typically seeing no need to mix with a species that has been his and his ancestors enemy for thousands of years. One day however, he comes across a human that piques his interest, and circumstance compels Jrake to save him despite his instincts telling him not to do so.

Rohn has been hit with tragedy, both emotional and physical. He too has become quite the loner, suffering through loss and guilt. Rohn escapes to the Alaskan wilderness to exert his independence, and a seemingly innocent outing winds up being an almost deadly occurrence. He awakens in a cave, saved by a mysterious "camper" who helps him recuperate. When Rohn finds out the truth, he's more curious than scared, and Jrake's honesty and absence of artifice charms him, making him want to strive towards living more fully.

These two should've never met, nor their connection should've ever worked. However due to their unique circumstances, they each realize the many things they've been missing, as they see a different way around their tragic pasts. What stands out is the impressive original storytelling, while at the same time bringing the parts of shifter lore that many of us readers enjoy. Perhaps a bit insta-love but there are no leaps of logic here, all reasoning and explanations fall easily and realistically in place - well as realistic as a paranormal romance can get when dealing with the idea of the enigmatic yeti.

Definitely hot, with lots of hurt comfort that goes both ways. These two disparate individuals cross innate barriers, their hard fought win bittersweet, their love hopefully an enduring triumph. My only question is, why hasn't this author written more? Apparently though, a second book is in the works!!
