My daughter received this book from the Dolly Parton Imagination Library. It is a book about an old-school diner/truck stop where everybody knows everybody. My daughter liked pointing out all of the different trucks in the book, but the overall story did not seem interesting to her.

Truck Stop may or may not feature a rhyme scheme -- it seemed to try at times, but never fully committed. Rockwell shares the story of a young boy whose family owns a truck stop diner and puts him to work in the mornings (gasp! child labor!). The regulars file their way in, but one regular doesn't show. When the kid gets on the bus to go to school, he sees this regular broken down on the side of the road and the bus driver agrees to call for help for the poor guy. Each regular is of a different race (tokenism, perhaps, given that the first two people are white and the first is a white man...hmmm). The end pages of Truck Stop illustrate different kinds of vehicles with their names, perfect for helping children to identify various trucks.

Illustrations throughout the book are in a cut-out-paper style and, while a few of the pages are especially interesting to look at, I didn't feel the illustrations stood out as a whole.

### **Hayley says**

The concept of this book is cute (a little kid opens up the family diner/truck stop each morning and greets the regulars and their vehicles before heading to school), but the text itself is clunky, especially to read aloud. There are a lot of sentence fragments, and phrasing choices that make this a poor readaloud choice (e.g. *"Where's Green Gus?" asks Eighteen-Wheeler's Sam.* -- this could have been *"Where's Green Gus?" asks Sam, the Eighteen-Wheeler driver* and it would be easier on the person reading aloud, and doesn't seem like a necessary clunky choice since the text doesn't rhyme or have a particular format. Little choices like that appear a couple times, so although my little one enjoys the story and the trucks, I'd prefer to read other truck books to her over this.
