This Review probably goes with The Remaining as this small story goes along with the book. One of the best things about books, I believe, is finding characters that are enduring and makes you want to read more about them. That can sometimes be hard in short stories because it is very hard to connect with the audience in such a short time span.

I will profess I am not huge into the zombie market like a ton of people are now a days cause those stories can beat with the proverbial stick so often that it is hard to find a great and engaging story involving zombies, in my opinion. D.J. is a good story teller in that he gets you engaged in the story from start to finish and I have found that out as I continue to read his novels in the hopes that after The Remaining that he will advance the story after a slow start. The Remaining : Faith is a continuation in what i feel is close to the location that the main character Lee is from, given some hints that some locations are intertwined between the two stories. The main character Clyde, however, is not someone i would particularly root for and he is definitely a whiny character. Some of the interactions and decisions that are made within the novel I feel aren't as portrayed as well as it should be. D.J. is developing the world around us as it changes to the infection but i think what is the real downfall for at least these first two stories is that his characters are not enduring enough to actually make that connection with.

It is perfectly alright to have angry or bad people in your story line, for a matter of fact in a lot of novel series you find yourself loving these characters cause you want to take em down yourself. The end part of the story is pretty good but the whole interactions and thought process of the main character rubbed me the wrong way as something that wouldn't go through my mind. For example, as the epidemic of this disease spreads and widespread panic is forming, who would worry about breaking an entering after many near death experiences that got most of the town killed and leaving money on the counter. I laugh cause at that point it would be for survival. This is a lengthy review for a short story but I don't like to give spoilers and by all means if you like zombie stories, his books are a good start but probably not my particular cup of tea.
