I've been kindly asked by the author if I'd like to review his book, therefore, here are my thoughts about it.

There have been some strange deaths of young girls, which seem like suicides. The detectives haven't been able to solve the cases, though they know they are related. There's a *monster* out there that doesn't leave the least clue about his/her identity.

It's summer, and Lili is working as a freelance writer for a newspaper. She obviously knows about those deaths, but doesn't think that those girls have been murdered, until one of the victims is killed in Lili's apartment. Suddenly, Lili's life has turned 180 degrees. The people she thought she knew aren't exactly what they seemed to be, and the murderer is closer than she could have imagined.

The story is mainly told by an omniscient narrator, though, sometimes, we get to know more about the murderer and his crimes because of his personal notes, the *Memoire of Senses*.

Regarding the characters, I was hoping to know more about Dr. Lengyel, and what one has been assuming during the whole novel about his peculiar way of analyzing the clues, is revealed at the end. Also, I don't know if it's just me, but Dr. Lengyel reminds me a bit of *Will Graham*.

I think it's an interesting story, although, the rough sex topic is not my cup of tea, I liked the idea that it was developed in a different way from what some latest books have been showing. In this story, the *I-like-it-rough* girls and *I-only-do-it-rough* guy are portrayed as people who absolutely need help. They aren't popular, neither successful. They know there's something wrong, but they don't want to change.

The social media sites and how we can interact with anyone from anywhere, especially with those we think might be similar to us, though, in reality, we have no idea who they really are, is one of the key points in this story. It's the tool for those twisted minds and the curse for those who want to experience a different kind of *love* life.

Finally, as a very personal opinion, I think that some scenes were a little too much. I know that, sometimes, it's necessary to describe in detail certain scenes, but in this case the reader can get the idea with the first murders descriptions. However, I liked the book, and recommend it to anyone who is interested in a different kind of thriller/mystery story.

So apparently this book is pretty big in Hungary, after reading this came as a big surprise so I've begun to suspect Lakatos may want to consider hiring a new translator and/or editor. Although it may also be a case of fame before writing talent (hey the former sells books, not necessarily the latter!)

Let me explain why I think this way about Love Club:

The explicit sex

Generally explicit sex scenes don't bother me on their own merit, what does bother me however, is when vivid, pornographic scenes take the place of genuine plot. The majority of this book is an exploration of the main villain's sexual perversions running right from childhood upwards. And this is no 'We need to talk about Kevin' each scene is essentially the author trying to outdo himself from the last with explicitly described sexual violence.

It seems to me that there is a cadre of authors out there trying to write the next 'Silence of the Lambs' by simply penning the most disgusting sexual crimes they can imagine and chucking in a little plot around them, aside from being unoriginal one finds themselves worrying about the author (rather than the characters in the story)

Most disturbingly this storyline is the best in the book, and honestly if the author cut his book down to an explicit chronology of a serial killer then this book would have some merit, rather than padding this tome out with 1-d characters

The 50 Shades of Grey rippoff

The first protagonist we are introduced to is Lili, a girl who 'likes it rough' and is next door having sex when the first murder of the book happens (in the room next door with doors open but unnoticed) she is wooing a rich heir but is also thinking about a former boyfriend, thusly the majority of her story is about her getting

bounced around in bed by Mr Gre- no Bence while thinking about someone else. Even though Bence bought her a puppy (hows that for literary tension?)

The police? investigation

This is where this book really shows its brilliance, Dr Lugubrious (real named changed for mocking purposes) is a criminal profiler helping the police. His first task is to gain the detectives trust and prove his controversial techniques are worthwhile...

The first deduction - this crime was done by a man

Bizarrely the police force take him up on this argument, despite 95% of violent crime being committed by men, and taking into account sexual violence involving penetration this number runs to 99.9%, the police still need a Phd to work this one out.

Although the Dr's reasoning is a little more solid than that - I almost fell off my chair when he stated that 'poison is the method of woman as keeping the crime scene clean will be a priority' Now in the authors defense maybe he meant that a woman would be smart enough to want to reduce the physical evidence, but in honesty the statement came across a little sexist.

Plus everyone knows that women use poison because it means they can kill easily from the kitchen (ha ha ha just kidding, its to do with physical strength)

Throw in a little handwriting analysis (little better than astrology for solving crime) the old cliché about profilers risking becoming the monster they hunt, and the character of a bunk criminal profiler is complete. Especially since this book is intended as the first in a series where this Eeyore solves more crimes.

So summarizing that rant, if I wasn't in desperate need to reach my reading goals for 2013 this would have probably been a shelver (or recycle binner on kindle) despite being politely asked to review it I feel that I've just read someone's daydream about being an author rather than a real book.
