What stands out for me in this series is that in and amongst the heavy tone, depressing reality of hate, and the constant self loathing Roan has - this is probably one of the smartest, snarkiest, funniest series I've read.

This book only works as part of the excellent series it belongs to - do not start here. In this seventh book, we get to spend time with old friends. Holden in particular gets more on page time, and progression in both his personal life and his role as a high-octane Robin to Roan's Batman. This is a good thing - I really appreciate time spent with Holden.

The cliff-hanger ending of book six is resolved with a surprisingly low-key progression. In fact, although Roan moves forward in his increasingly amoral vigilantism, and escalates his battles with self-loathing as much as with the lion within, this book feels a bit status quo for Roan, and Dylan. This has a couple of mysteries, one fairly minor and swiftly resolved. There are some fun scenes with the country's coolest hockey team. Roan and Dylan share a few emotional moments, while still choosing to keep half of a wall between them about important issues. Publicity about Roan's unique status as an evolving viral-human hybrid, with the avalanche of disasters that could ensue, hovers but never falls. This is a nice series book, about characters I care for, but not one that breaks new ground for them. It feels like that's coming, though. Roan's secret can't be kept forever, and perhaps Dylan and Holden can gang up on Roan's damnable obsession with self-sufficiency.... next book?

Quick Information:

This book consists of two separate stories. Based on the free version, chapter 1 - 20 is titled "Meantime" while chapter 21 - 38 is titled "Undertow". Just in case if you think the flow between chapter 20 and 21 is a bit weird :)

Meantime: (Chapter 1-20)

Roan was locked in a coma and struggled between his lion and human side. Holden looked into a murder of an old friend. Fiona took case about underground death matches between infecteds. When Roan woke up, he went straight back to work and involved in both cases...

Holden got a little bit more spotlight here, since Roan was in a coma. And I loved that. I loved how he was confused with his relationship with Scott (Holden didn't do boyfriend!) but he realized that he liked being with Scott, and when he got toughen up from a job, he came to Scott's instead of his own place. I loved Grey, Scott's hockey buddy -- though I was sad that he got signed with the Flyers and must left Seattle.

Roan and Dylan was as solid as ever. It was interesting with this series because I loved Paris (Roan's first husband) and I thought Paris *was* the love of Roan's life. But at the same time, I knew that Roan also loved Dylan (and vice versa). Dylan wasn't a consolation prize and their relationship was good and comfortable and significant. I guess it showed how one's heart was capable of different kind of love. One of my favorite scenes would be in the hospital, when Roan first woke up and found Dylan in the room. Or when Roan apologized to Dylan for making his husband worried. It was beautiful...

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Undertow: (Chapter 21-38)

Although it is opened with Roan's police friend retirement party, this story moves to a different path altogether. No long after, Roan is hired by the daughter of a missing woman, who is considered as a 'probable' victim of serial rapist. This case have Roan and Dylan visiting a town where the woman used to lived with her family. And after investigating, Roan finds out that the murderer was closer to home.

But to me, this one was pretty much like an afterthought mystery. It was solved pretty 'early' ... what followed mostly was Roan's struggling with his lion. It seems that his lion taking more control when Roan is semi-unconscious so he needs to check himself to the clinic, to see what is wrong with him. There are moments where Roan seems so vulnerable, when he seeks comfort from his husband, Dylan, and for me this

was heartbreaking.

The tone of this second part feels more somber. Roan needs to deal with his lion and the possibility that his lion may surface on its own and hurt the people he loves. There are a couple of chapters from Dylan's perspective in here too, and I felt closer to him as well.

There was also a development with Holden whose relationship with Scott was, well, moving to further point. It was funny to me, as well as endearing, how Holden doesn't know how to deal with this relationship with Scott. Holden doesn't do falling in love, and the way that he starts to care for Scott so very much infuriates the hell out of him. I was giggling when Holden moans over this issue to Roan. Scott totally destroys Holden's 'wall' *laugh*. Oh, and Holden finally gets his license, that is totally something to look forward to.

I am intensely fond of these books, despite their flaws (more on that later). Unfortunately, it feels as though the story isn't moving significantly forward in this one. Yes, Holden does make some advances in his personal and professional life -- but, for Roan, it seems to be mostly just more of the same.

As for flaws -- I've criticized Speed's prose in the past, and that's still somewhat problematic here. Nonetheless, I do think there's a notable progression since the first book in the series. She seems to have a better grasp on her previously-overflowing commas and run-on sentences, for one thing. There's still nothing polished about the way she writes, but she gets her point across for the most part.

Unfortunately, there are also other sorts of problems that have plagued her throughout the series. For instance, these books have always had consistency problems that should have been resolved before the books ever made it into print -- one example is a character who is described as having "liver failure" at one point, but then is said to have "kidney failure" later in the book. Another example regards Roan's tattoos. Roan already has a tattoo of the biohazard symbol, and at one point he considers adding a tattoo of the "medical waste" symbol -- even though "medical waste" and "biohazard" both use the SAME symbol.

These are careless mistakes that should have been caught. Though they don't usually have a huge impact on the story itself, they are distracting and damage the suspension of disbelief.

Also, I still dislike the series' pattern of breaking down each book into two distinct halves, with separate short mysteries in each half. Forcing mysteries into such short spaces prevents Speed from adequately

developing *any* of the mysteries, and fragments the plot arc over the course of the book as a whole. I wish she would take the time to expand ONE mystery plotline through an entire book -- these things would benefit from being given the room to breathe.

On the up side, I still love the way Speed handles angst and emotion in general. I'm not sure how she does it, but she does manage to make all those emotions real for me. For the most part she does a good job of bringing the characters to life.

Because of the lack of significant progression in this book, I can't give it 4 stars. I'm rating this one at 3.4, and rounding down.
