I would love for Jeff Wheeler to write a novella telling more about what happened in the 4 years between *Storm Glass* and *Mirror Gate*.

As we learned in *Storm Glass*, Cettie has an affinity for the Mysteries, and they come to her easily. Sera, on the other hand, sucks at it, and not mastering the Mysteries may put her destiny at risk.

One thing that frustrated me in this book is how everyone kept explaining that all Cettie's problems would be solved once she learns the Mysteries, even though some of those problems were life-threatening, and no one ever recommended taking the test early or anything... Many times in a series, book 2 gets lost. It ends up being a transition book that does little more than get you from book 1 to book 3. *Mirror Gate*, the second book in the Harbinger series, is anything but typical. I actually enjoyed this book more than book 1. Why? Well, first of all the book dug more into the fantasy

element - the magic. Anytime that happens, you have my full attention. Second, the book opens in a setting that allows you to really fall into step with the characters. In book 1 there was so much the character had to encounter and endure right away, before I barely even felt familiar with them, it was a little more difficult to fully engage. Now that I know them better, and in this more personal setting, being fully engaged was immediate.

Of course, there were all the good things that make Wheeler's books so consistently good - secondary characters that enrich the story, political intrigue that thickens the plot, and of course lots and lots of twists and turns. If I had to find any fault at all, it's that at one point there was such a feeling of bleak hopelessness it was almost overwhelming to the point of becoming unenjoyable. Thankfully, just as for our struggling MC (or one of the two, I should say), there was solace to be found in the words and wisdom of the story's two artfully crafted mentor characters.

This book 2 also did a great job of giving enough to not be a complete cliffhanger, while leaving you totally helpless and pacing while you wait for the next book, which thanks to Wheeler's quick-release publication practice isn't so far into the future that you're tempted to bang your head against a wall. Kudos, Mr. Wheeler. Another masterpiece, and master piece in the chess board that is this series.

Honestly, I can't say enough about this series. I love the characters, I love the series, I love the way it ties into his other novels (oh heck! spoiler!!) Being as this is the second book in the series it's kind of hard to avoid spoiling at least little things, so I'm going to try to be as vague as possible, but you are warned.

In book two of the Harbinger series we return to Sera and Cettie. The two young girls with an affinity for "the Mysteries" of this world, have been training and growing in the years that have passed since the first book, *Storm Glass*. While Cettie has proven to be a natural at connecting to the magical forces around them, Sera is having a difficult time. As the daughter of the Prince Regent she is beset with political intrigue and is unprepared to deal with those already moving to do her harm. Cettie also finds herself the target of a particularly dangerous foe (friend? family?). I'm not sure how things will turn out for the girls, but I can't tell you how happy I was to hear that book three is coming out later this year, so I won't have to wait too long! Mr. Wheeler is showering us with riches this year!

I have to admit that Cettie is still my favorite. Last book I saw her as a Jane Eyre type character, but this book I am definitely getting some Esther Summerson (*Bleak House*) vibes from her. She even has her own Mr. Guppy hanging about, causing her consternation with his absolute adoration. I love a Charles Dickens nod! Another character I adore unabashedly is Lord Fitzroy. I do love a book with grey characters, those who are not 100% good or bad, but one thing I love about this series is there are characters who really are a white knight, 100% on the side of the angels. Fitzroy is someone you can just love and that feels almost like a relief to this reader.

I will warn you, this paragraph contains a BIG spoiler as we are starting to see some connection ... to Kingfountain. In *Storm Glass*, we found our way to Muirwood (which felt like a homecoming), so this is an exciting new development that ties us even closer to the original books by Mr. Wheeler.

If you couldn't tell I really enjoy these books, and if you like fantasy, especially clean fantasy then this is the series for you. Book three is coming soon and I can't wait to see what happens to Cettie and Sera, as well as see how they tie into the larger history of these worlds. I'm holding my breath for an ARC. I previously reviewed the first in the series, *Storm Glass*, here - <http://bit.ly/2ogMHh8>

If you bothered clicking the link, you'll notice I really liked it. I really liked this one too. "Why four stars instead of five?" you say (conversation may not have happened.)

Well, here goes. The first in the series was quite unique, a steam-punk Victorian world with a mysterious magic system and interesting characters. It's still here, but less unique (obviously). My problem is with the first third or so of the book. The time has jumped four years, with nary a hint of what went on it time. In fact, hardly anything goes on in that first third at all, I was struggling to maintain my interest. Cettie and Sera had been roomies at Muirwood Abbey for four years, with little but some hints at Cettie being awesome controlling the Mysteries, while poor ol' Sera being a bit of a lame duck.

Then...

After dozing through 100 or so pages, Wheeler ramps up the pace - a lot. One of the girls is attacked, Sera's

grandfather pops his clogs, opening up a vacancy at Emperor, one Sera is in the running for. There are rumours of war with Kingfountain, who seem to have improved their technology to an advanced state. Throw in the standard politicking and social one-upping, along with Cettie's discovering a lot more about her ghosts, old flames showing up at inopportune moments and the rest of the book is a rip.

Wheeler has ramped up the stakes for everyone involved (including the reader) and I find it hard to believe that the majority of those who read book two, will not be interested in reading book three. There is some fine world-building and storytelling going on here. Give it 4.4/5

New and Exciting Adventures

Mirror Gate, the second book in the Harbinger Series, continues the sagas of Cettie and Sera that were introduced in Storm Glass. If you have not yet read that book, go back and read it first. Then pick up this book and get ready for an adventure!

I work at a university in the residence halls, and it was fun to see Cettie and Sera experience many of the same emotions and feelings that are common among students who go away from home to attend school. Their experiences, though mingled with magic and terrors that do not exist in our world, were relatable to experiences common to those of us living outside the pages of a book. Jeff's ability to connect us with his characters is masterfully done, and I often felt happy, sad, anxious, upset, and overwhelmed along with these two young women as they experience the challenges that life throws at them.

For me, this book started out a little slower, but once it picked up, I could not put it down. Having read many of Jeff's other series, it was fun to find connections to some of his other worlds, and to have my mind expand in that way. It was hard for me to gage how someone unfamiliar with some of his other worlds and magic systems, and political landscapes would understand all of the intricacies introduced into this series. I feel like the Harbinger series can stand on it's own, but being familiar with the Muirwood and Kingfountain from Jeff's other books adds depth and understanding to an already well written novel.

The only real downside of reading this book when I did is that it will be a few months before I can continue the adventure—a real test of patience being left in the unknown. But, like most experiences in life often are while in the middle of them, Jeff leaves us hanging with high tensions, many unknowns, and yet an undergirding of hope of good things to come. I recommend this book, and eagerly anticipate the release of the next book in the series: Iron Garland.

Disclaimer: Review is spoiler-free. I received an advanced copy of this book from the publisher. Mirror Gate is the second installment in the Harbinger series.

Mirror Gate is a female-led epic with elements of steampunk, flintlock fantasy, and high fantasy sorcery. Jeff Wheeler presents an enchanting story about the struggles civilization faces as it attempts to build upon itself, and the failings that we oftentimes accept and grow through when we exchange anarchy for stability.

I review books for a chance to find ones like Mirror Gate. This really is a beautiful story of personal growth, hope, and the many faces of human interactions. I think it's worth your time; it was worth mine. Let's get into the review.

Plot

The plot of Mirror Gates revolves around the machinations of an empire constantly at threat by, and trying to cooperate with, rival worlds. The titular mirror gates, large and mystical land formations, allow these other worlds to intrude upon the empire's own and for its people to intrude back into them in turn.

The book very much follows the formula of an upright noble trying to overthrow a despot. This is done smartly, though. Between the vibrant world and the cast of characters you never feel as if you're being fed tired cliches, but rather lovingly retold story tropes.

Refreshingly, the nature of war and politics is explored in an understandable and completely non-patronizing way. This adds a non-politicized, fair, and thoughtful depth that's very welcome.

Characters

Endearing, lively, and varied--those words describe the cast of Mirror Gate. The larger than life personalities, all veering to be heard and to make the changes they believe in, drive the conflict. The characters run this story, the story does not run the characters.

The two main protagonists are both different and deep enough to make each of their viewpoints engaging. Cettie--someone of much lower birth than the high society--is polite, measured, and stalwartly dignified in the face of her many struggles. Sera, a royal determined to keep her pompous father from permanently claiming the emperor's throne, is empathetic, hot-blooded, and devoted to doing the right thing--even if she's not always sure what that is.

The cast of individuals surrounding the two main stars are never lifeless, never boring, and always distinctive. There's something for everyone to see and enjoy on display here--from reserved doctors and nervous but good-natured dorks, all the way to manipulative harpies.

In the hands of another writer, the villains of Mirror Gate may have come off as rather lopsidedly evil--that didn't happen here. The motivations for the opposing of the protagonists by certain factions are made very clear and, if one takes a step back from the convincing viewpoints of Cettie and Sera, then one can at least understand the antagonists; this makes them real, this makes them interesting, and this makes them pleasantly human.

Writing

Jeff Wheeler is very good at explaining things simply. He's very good at setting the mood for and describing

characters. He's also quite good with imagery.

His words are never quite poetic, save in the excerpts written by a certain scholarly character that come before numerous chapters--those were superbly in-character and strikingly poignant. I think this style was purposeful though, in an effort to not sacrifice flow on the altar of purple prose.

I was also pleasantly surprised to find that the author had worked his way up from self-publishing to being a successful traditionally published writer; this is explained in a heartfelt and humble afterword that seems to speak volumes about the man's character.

Conclusion

Mirror Gate is in my top five novels I've read this year. I would recommend it to anyone who likes high fantasy and doesn't mind a bit of a YA bend. It also may be a great novel for those seeking to read about female heroes.

Final verdict: a very high 4/5 stars.
