Why did I wait so long to read this book?

Every so often I come across a book on my kindle mountain that I meant to read ages ago. This must-read book got lost under an avalanche of clicking and buying book after book after book. *whispers book addiction* :D I won't let it happen to a Lou Harper book again though.

Lou Harper creates such a warm, easy flow of emotions and energy on the page. Pages that I love visiting. Men I love to root for and smile with.

Dead in the Desert picks up a few months after Dead in L.A. with roommates Leander and Jon. We jump right back in with Leander's psychic jobs and Jon's grumpiness, and their friends with sweet, sexy benefits relationship. Can Jon and Leander (Andy to Jon) push past their fears and pasts to build a future together?

These guys fit so well together. I love spending time with them. The way their different moods spark and feed off each other creates such a fun, flirty feel to the action. Jon's grumbling comes out in fierce protectiveness and stabs of jealousy here & there that pushes him to take care of Andy in such adorable ways—cooking for him, urging him to wear sunscreen, or take a nap. The big Grumpy Bear reveals his big thumping heart over and over again. I could feel Jon's love in all his worry and care. But he's still hesitating. He's just so scared of falling in love and losing it all over again.

Paired right along with Jon's surliness is Leander's smile and patience. Leander is a ray of light! His sunshine and joyful, sweet moods are contagious—his smile jumps right off the page into my day. The cutie makes me happy! I want a Leander in my life. Plus the man's book addiction could (maybe) put mine to shame! The way he tucks himself into a book, curled up next to Jon on the couch never fails to kick up my need to get home and read, read, read!

And then there are the words! Lou Harper has a wonderful way with words. Some of my favorites—bamboozled and shyster--make an appearance. But also spiel, zingers, cockles and more. So much magic in her word choices alone never mind the emotion and fun behind them all. Jon's love and Leander's patience can be felt in every line, page and place. Oh, does Ms. Harper capture the heat of the dessert and the mood of L.A. I felt this city! The LA County Morgue shop was my favorite touch. The morgue really does have a gift shop! I bought one or two hell...a few things there myself once upon a time.

Now for the dreaded epilogue word. I really considered not reading it. I've had some bad experiences recently—BURNED by a few actually. This is another good installment in the L.A. Paranormal series, and hopefully not the last. This story lets us see Jon and Leander more than half a year into their relationship, which is now one of friends with plenty of sexy benefits (although the actual sex scenes are rather briefly presented - nice but not detailed.) It's pretty clear that they actually care more about each other than mere friendship, but Andy isn't pushing, and Jon is still holding back to protect his heart from future loss. A couple of new cases of missing people bring them in contact with dead bodies and the police, in a story that is interesting and melodramatic in content while being matter-of-fact in tone. We get a few moments between the guys that have a sweet resonance, as they begin to talk more about their feelings for each other. This was a very fast read - a bit more solid and satisfying than the two previous novellas, but still a brief taste that left me eager to spend more in-depth time with these two guys.

Dead in the Desert is the second book in the L.A. Paranormal series, and it is one complete story and not a collection of novellas, which I loved! In all honesty it can be read as a standalone, which was exactly how I intended to read it... however a few pages in and I had fallen in love with the characters and I had to go back and start from the beginning... I wanted more, so I stopped mid flow, downloaded *Dead in L.A.* and started from the beginning and didn't stop till I had finished both books... YES! They are *that* good... I couldn't put them down!

So we first meet the boys *In Dead in L.A* where Andy is a ray of sunshine to Jon's life filled with storm clouds and rain. Andy is a psychic who finds things, cats, dogs, missing jewellery, he is adorable and such an unassuming character, where as Jon on the other hand is grumpy to say the least, racked by guilt over the death of his wife, trying to put his life back together, attending college but unable to drag himself out of the darkness that consumes him, preferring solitude and self imposed isolation. As a pessimist he doesn't allow himself to feel for fear of the unknown, of what might happen if he lets down his guard and allows someone into his heart again... I got the impression he was subconsciously punishing himself, but Andy's easy manner and self confidence wormed his way into his life and Jon was no longer able to distance himself from the vibrant sparkle that was Andy and it had all happened without him having realised it

Dead in the Desert takes place ten months after they had become room mates and seven months into their friends with benefits relationship.

Detective Lipkin makes another appearance to call on Andy's psychic services to locate a dead body, but the main story line is locating a missing person. Andy is hired by a lawyer to find Ethan Novak, the son of the serial killer Clive Riddel. Clive's Uncle has left a vast fortune in his will to Ethan, a boy he didn't know, for no other reason than to piss off his family, only Ethan has been missing for seven years and needs to be located before the family have him declared dead.

This is not a detective thriller and neither Jon or Andy are investigators per se, they actually sit on the periphery of the actual investigations...with all the pieces falling into place in the background and the boys just contributing a small part, well actually it is Andy and his psychic abilities that are in demand, but over protective Jon is not too happy about him being involved without being there himself... just in case! I would say this is more of a mystery and Lou Harper keeps us engaged throughout... seeing the boys dipping in and

out and the threads all coming together, I was hanging on every little piece of information!

Andy can't resist helping, it's who he is... he is just a kind and generous soul, who also happens to be hilarious, his banter with Jon, addiction to food porn and obsession with books had me laughing out loud, he is just a fun and zany character, modest with a casual approach to his gift, learning as he goes along, to him it's a living and definitely not something to be abused, and Jon is on hand to make sure no harm comes to his man! Jon is possessive and protective of Andy, but not in a suffocating way, he cares about Andy but finds it hard to express his feelings and emotions and his mother hen ways are just his subconscious affections coming to the fore.

We also see Jon battling with his emotions, coming to terms with the fact that Andy has indeed broken down the barriers that have for so long guarded his heart, looking at Andy as part of his future, but insecure... unsure of what *he* means to Andy, he wants more than friends with benefits which was Andy's idea in the first place, and although we don't get a glimpse as to what is going on in Andy's head, only having Jon's POV I got the impression he was holding back not wanting to push Jon or force the issue of a relationship, knowing how emotionally damaged Jon is.

The romance develops at a sedate pace all enhanced by the investigations, it is a subtle blend of romance and mystery and the whole package is combined perfectly... it's just an excellent read with engaging characters and fascinating plot lines that will have you chuckling all the way through!

There is an epilogue to this... and so very clever, I loved it! I am also wondering if it might be another direction the lovely Ms Harper may be taking us in?!?

This is and EXCELLENT book and I defy you not to love it!

After helping Detective Lipkin with finding a body in the desert, Leander (or "Andy" to Jon) accepts a case from a lawyer, who wants Andy to find a young man who has disappeared for several years, in order to give him money and property from his dead uncle. The young man is the son of a convicted killer. Jon, Andy's roommate and friends with benefit, goes along to help because he feels protective and caring and all those other "feels" that he has come to associate when it comes to Andy.

Unlike the previous book, *Dead in L.A.*, *Dead in the Desert* doesn't have episodic mystery. Instead, all chapters are a continuous story, combining romance and a dash of mystery. If I can categorize this book for my own purpose, I will call it a comfort mystery romance. Both Jon and Andy are not part of the police force nor they are professional private detectives. There isn't any heavy legwork of investigation, interviewing

suspects, and such. But Andy would get dreams and new clues about where to find Ethan and then he and Jon would follow it through.

The romance part is more quiet. I love the difference of the two men. Jon is the grumpy bear and Andy is the ray of sunshine, but they match so well. Since this is written from Jon's point-of-view, we don't get much inner thoughts of Andy, but it is perfectly fine. Andy is more open and it is easy to see how Jon drawn to him. Instead we will get Jon's inner perspective about this new-found relationship.

I love it when Jon feels protective or slightly jealous or exasperated when Andy doesn't eat well or being cranky if he must gets up early in the morning. I might wonder what Andy sees in Jon -- but I also know how opposites attract. Andy might see Jon as someone dependable, someone to lean on, who will always be there when he feels exhausted or disturbed by his dreams.

It might feel restrained but I always love that kind of story better than overdone drama. There is a beautiful gesture when Jon finally takes off his wedding ring, realizing that it is time to let go of his past and grabs this new chance of happiness with Andy. I feel that they will always be the type of couple who would be comfortable with each other without having to talk about everything under the sun.

And the epilogue is a nice touch...

A very enjoyable sequel to the paranormal mystery *Dead in L.A.*. This time, psychic Leander and his cranky “roommate”/lover Jon are on the case of a missing person, and as they search, they unearth more mysteries (and a few bodies.)

Grouchy Jon is the narrator, and I love him. His narrative voice is solid, a little stark, and straightforward. As the reader, you get to enjoy all the hints about how much Jon cares about Leander, even though he's not

willing to admit it to himself. I find his voice and also his and Andy's dialogue a real treat, and I love watching him come undone, even when it's in that tightly controlled Jon way.

It's a pretty laid-back mystery, even more so than the first one. In one way, it's a very relaxing, enjoyable read, but I wouldn't have minded a little more tension near the end.

Overall, I enjoyed it very much, and if you dug Dead in L.A. you probably will dig this as well. It can probably stand alone, but I don't know why you'd wanna skip book 1. It's a great read too.

I read this immediately after Dead in LA. I literally closed one book and opened the other, because I didn't want to lose the momentum, as I often do when waiting between books. I only really discovered Lou Harper this year and I am gradually making my way through all her books.

I love this series about Jon and Leander. I like the way there is no sudden head long dash into love in this story. Instead Jon is very cautious recognising his growing feelings for Leander but also having to come to terms with the loss of his wife years before. So this is a nice slow burn romance at the centre of an interesting story about a psychic.

Leaving the coppers to their work, Andy is then contacted by a lawyer to locate a missing person who disappeared seven years ago. It appears the young man is to inherit quite a lot of money and if he can't be found, his relatives will have him declared dead. It also turns out he's the natural son of a convicted serial killer who was put to death in Louisiana. And, his birth mother may or may not have helped with the killings. Hmm.

'Dead in the Desert' was just as fantastic as the first installment. I loved it. I loved getting back to the guys and watching Andy work his mojo and solve old mysteries. I loved watching Jon and Andy fumble around their feelings. And, I really hope Lou Harper doesn't make me wait too long before the next installment.
