I enjoyed True Love Way which is about being true to yourself, following your heart and finding what is right in your life, whether it is what you expected or not. Family and friendship holds a huge theme in this light hearted read about pining away for the one that got away and then discovering maybe he wasn't what you thought or remembered in the first place.

The whole friendship dynamic in True Love Way made me nostalgic for Friends and I wanted bury myself under the covers and watch reruns. Marlo has two best friends. Her bestie from childhood, Savannah, lives several hours away from Marlo and has a pre-teen daughter who Marlo helped raise when she was a child. Savannah's much older brother, Nik, has become Marlo's other best friend when they both moved to the same city knowing only each other. Marlo and Nik hang out all the time. Now add Josh, Marlo's high school sweetheart, who shows up a decade after breaking her heart by moving to Paris without her and whose return turns all their lives upside down.

From the outset, I could see how clueless Marlo was that Nik was completely besotted with her (no spoiler – it's pretty obvious) and I really loved Nik. He was kind, courteous and loved Marlo's great Aunt Margaret who he always visited along with Marlo and helped her whenever he could. He was nice. And lovely. And then there was Josh, who I hated. I wanted to punch him in the face. And then punch Marlo when she didn't listen to the little nagging feelings of negativity that kept popping up.

I couldn't understand how Marlo would suddenly run back to an ex-boyfriend. Having never had this inclination myself, I couldn't really relate to this aspect of the story and how she assumed they would go waltzing down the aisle even though he broke her heart so many years ago. Marlo and Josh had made a pact during a tender teenage moment and she presumed it was all to work out now that the pact date loomed? What? Just because they made a stupid pact, it negates her previous broken heart? Wouldn't he just do it all over again? Did she really want to be his backup plan? I wanted to shake Marlo and show her what was right in front of her and how much of a jack-ass Josh was.

At the same time I could relate to how she wanted her happy ending so she ignored some signs she probably should have paid more attention to. I think all of us overlook some things in order to get our happy ending, whether it's things we should ignore or not and eventually I could relax because Marlo slowly started to trust her instincts.

There was such a strong focus on relationships in this novel – not just love relationships - and I loved that. Even with a secret revealed that threatens them (which was a bit obvious for my taste), all the friendships and family ties were so strong and I think this was the strength of True Love Way. I absolutely adored Marlo's great aunt, Margaret, and that Marlo and Nik had such a lovely relationship with her, visiting, cooking and watching old movies with her. Even Marlo's relationship with her parents was strong and seemed realistic to me, even though I probably wouldn't share as much with my family, being a little more private than some. Even Marlo's relationships with her friends was more like family. These connections are what will stick with me most about True Love Way.

One thing that I want to mention is the title and cover. Unfortunately a book is often judged by its cover and I wish it had been stronger to compliment this story which is much stronger than both. I didn't base any part of my review rating on this, but I wanted to mention it because I really don't think they do True Love Way justice and I wish more attention had been given to them.

As this novel wrapped up, twinges of emotion wormed through me which says a lot. Although not entirely original and a bit predictable, I enjoyed Marlo's path to self-discovery and especially loved the abundance of close relationships in this novel.

Nancy Scrofano offers a fun and entertaining read about a quirky heroine who is determined to rekindle the sparks with an old flame in True Love Way.

I am a fan of Nancy's work as a blogger and reviewer, so I was especially delighted to find myself a fan of her fiction as well.

Marlo is definitely a unique character, which sets this chick lit novel apart from others. Her love of retro -- an interest shared with the author who created her -- makes for a humorous and playful quirk. She wants to find love and goes after it even after having little success in the past. Though a little silly, she is generally a nice person who I found easy to like and identify with. This made it easy to fall into her story and get caught up in the action.

My theory about guys like Josh was confirmed in this story: Even though they seem like a good idea, they almost never turn out that way. Usually a relationship from the past broke down for a reason. Until you know the reason and find a resolution, there is not much use. Part of Marlo's journey is coming to terms with what happened and realizing that no matter how much she wills it, they can not pick up where they left off and live happily ever after. That's a good lesson ladies -- especially if you're like me and occasionally have a soft spot for exes (only to receive harsh reminders of why they're exes).

See how easy it was for me to identify with Marlo? I'm projecting on her.

While we're talking about having soft spots, I also love a good story where a heroine begins to look at a close friend in a new light, for better or worse. When romance mingles with friendship, I like it no matter what happens. Marlo and Nik's story line was fun to read, and mixed with some additional twists and turns.

Just like her Aunt Madge, I just wanted those two kids to figure things out. It made for a tense couple of hours as I read and wondered what would happen in the end.

Scrofano also writes well and has a solid storytelling voice. For me, I will read any story, no matter how seemingly predictable it might seem -- as long as it has a good voice and strong writing. Plus, the story was just so darn cute.

Savannah was also abandoned by a high school sweetheart and has been a single parent for eleven years. Marlo's other mainstay is Savannah's brother, Nik. Nik was too much older to hang with the girls in high school but now that he and Marlo are living in the same city away from their families, they have formed a close friendship.

But now Marlo has a decision to make. She receives an email after twelve years from Josh. Josh says he is back in town and has never forgotten Marlo. I was in a bit of a unique situation when I was asked to review *True Love Way* by debut writer Nancy Scrofano. I actually virtually befriended Nancy via our blogs. She runs the fab site Chick Lit Bee. When Nancy had finished writing *True Love Way*, she asked me for a manuscript critique. I happily obliged, enjoyed her story, and was excited to see what happened next. My other good friend, Lucie Simone, runs an indie publishing company, Simon and Fig, and took on Nancy and her story. And...here we are! Nancy can now add "published author" to her long list of accomplishments. So, let me jump into my review.

The heroine of this story is Marlo Spencer, a retro-loving gal who is addicted to classic TV shows. And who has been holding out for her Mr. Wrong for too long. When high school boyfriend Josh finally reconnects with Marlo after twelve years of silence, Marlo doesn't waste any time driving from Malibu to her hometown of Napa. Her best friend Nik makes the journey with, as his family and sister – Savannah, Marlo's close friend – also still live in Napa. Marlo loves seeing Savannah and her daughter, as well as her parents, but she is really there for Josh. Could it be after all this time that they will finally get together? But Marlo's happy homecoming doesn't go anywhere near planned, when old secrets are revealed, friendships are tested, and Marlo figures out where her heart truly lies.

I thought this was a really fun chick lit read. Scrofano has a talent for creating characters, and I felt like Marlo and I could be pals. I even love me some *I Love Lucy* like she does. There was drama, romance, tears, and love. The only thing I didn't like so much was that I felt the big secret was fairly obvious. With little previous experience with the genre of chick lit, I picked up *TRUE LOVE WAY* and found it to be an enjoyable read and well-written debut. The story was a good mixture of funny/cute scenes and tender moments. The characters were well-drawn and realistic; their unique "quirks" (ie. Marlo's obsession with everything retro, an especially fun addition) made them more "real" in the eyes of the reader. The old TV show-connected dreams in particular served as a delightful manifestation of Marlo's "quirk" . . . and I found myself visualizing those scenes as if they were really on TV.

Although I am a hopeless romantic, I loved how the story wasn't just about the love triangle. Marlo's close

ties to her family were also key. As I am close to my family, I could relate to that aspect of the story. I especially liked Aunt Madge and thought that her backstory was as endearing as her personality. Although Marlo and her friends were the main characters, Aunt Madge was truly the most significant, for she connected the past to the present with her "timeless" love story. She was the uniting force that tied the story together. Additionally, atmosphere---which could arguably be viewed as a character in and of itself--- was well developed. The settings near the ocean were quite nice and somehow deepened the meaning of the story. However, what stood out most of all was Miss Scrofano's gift with dialogue . . . very impressive! It has been said that an understanding of individual characters may be revealed through their thoughts, the comments of other characters, and the interaction between the two. While Miss Scrofano expertly used all three, the dialogue stood out especially as the strong link for both the individual character and for the story as a whole. As a result, the novel itself could easily be visualized as a TV show or movie . . . an assertion that Marlo would likely approve. :)
