Anyone who is a fan of great writing, hilarious inner dialogue and banter and cardigans as a staple of classic fashion....this is the book for you! It is a novella full of laugh out loud moments, great friends and family and a low angst, but all heart story. Don't doubt me, I know what I'm talking about.

Mason is the type of guy that you love from the very first word....which he even says himself should have been "dick" but he decided to go the more formal route with his introduction. He's an avid reader who works in a library and spends all of his time wrapped inside the lives of fictional characters, rather than living in the real world.

"I'll read anything since I'm something of a book slut...When it comes to reading, I'm the girl in the short skirt at the end of the bar just around closing time. Slide a good, or bad, book in front of me, and my eyes pop open quicker than that lonely girl's thighs."

Both **Mason and Shane** are completely adorable start to finish, with Mason being a cardigan-addicted book worm and Shane being a fitness-addicted marathon runner.

Some of my favorite parts of this book were the self-deprecating humor from Mason regarding his own eccentricities and the types of MM fiction that he read. I nearly shit myself over the blurb from "Easter Lust":

Easter Lust. It's a story about a bunny rabbit shifter who meets a chicken shifter. They come together, fall in love, and then, tragically, discover they're both submissive bottoms. They try bumping butts for a while (great scene with a double-headed dildo) and then they meet a dominant wolf shifter who's into leather and bossing people around. He buggers them both mercilessly and everyone ends up happy. Five stars.

And blurting. GOD, do I love a good, unfiltered blurter, which Mason most definitely is. Like during his first boxing lesson, just after running away when the coach tried to punch him.

The book & the cover....

How can I not like this book? It's about a bookworm. I'm a bookworm. It has a beauty in it. I wanna fuck a beauty...then fall massively in love. (The “fuck” is the important part but, really, is any of that last sentence too much to ask?) And that cover! Would licking that guy's abs and then sucking on his nips constitute sexual harassment? Yes? Fucking PC police, a girl can't get away with anything anymore.

Librarians...don't even ask (you don't have to, I'm willing to share).

Let me tell you something about librarians, OK? You probably imagine they're something like this:

But the librarians I know are nothing like that.

About 150 years ago I worked at the Knight Library in Eugene, OR. One Christmas I had a party and I invited the librarians. I thought I was pretty hardcore as I drank white wine (zinfandel, baby, I like to go *all out!*) and ate marshmallows while decorating for said party. Then the librarians showed up. Let me inform you of something: THOSE BITCHES CAN PARTY. What I thought would be a nice little get-together

turned into this:

I'm not even joking. It was cray-cray. With an extra splash of cray.

(Plus another librarian drank my *entire* bottle of Francis Ford Coppola Cabernet wine. To this day I haven't tried it as *refuse* to let it go. Bastard.)

The MC in *Beauty and the Bookworm*, Mason, is nothing like those librarians. He has a cardigan for every occasion. He keeps his nose so close to his e-reader there's probably a permanent oil stain there. (Okay, that sounds disgusting, but c'mon! I've had to wipe mine down with alcohol a time or two. Or once a day. Whatever.) The worst thing you can say about him is that he has bad taste in men when he's drunk. (Who doesn't?) He spends all his time reading MM Romance. (Who doesn't?) Clearly the author is a dude familiar with the frequent ridiculousness of MM (or any romance):

Easter Lust...a story about a bunny rabbit shifter who meets a chicken shifter. They come together, fall in love, and then, tragically, discover they're both submissive bottoms. They try bumping butts for a while...and then they meet a dominant wolf shifter...He buggers them both mercilessly and every one ends up happy. 5 stars.

I completely identified with Mason. (See nose to e-reader remark above.) He's not quite shy, but he is a sarcastic introvert. He answers the question "what are you reading?" with impressive lies. He also reminds me of a more sarcastic version of Pageant's MC Billy in *Billy's Turn*. Both Billy & Mason spend so much time looking down or reading books they fail to notice anyone around them. There's an excellent quote about this from *Billy's Turn*:

"[Y]ou never let yourself meet anybody. Stop staring at the damned ground all the time or Prince Charming is going to walk by without noticing."

In *Beauty and the Bookworm*, Mason's gran makes a similar statement:

"It's time you stopped reading about love and started looking for it."

Uh...ow. Those quotes are like a one-two punch to the kidney.

In both books, Pageant shows he understands what it's like to be one of life's observers. He's familiar with at least the idea of feeling like an outsider even amongst those who accept him. What it's like to use humor as your only defense. His talent lies in his ability to communicate these feelings subtly, without clumsy statements.

On finding Mr. Charming.

Ok, let us speak of Shane. Other for some grammatical errors (which I barely noticed) and mixing names up at one point, Shane is my only real complaint (and not a serious one). Like the love interest in Cardeno C.'s *Perfect Imperfections*, Shane is a little too perfect. Other than some light issues with his brother, Shawn, Shane is the perfect, supportive boyfriend. When I first reviewed this book in May I said this -- *I like a little more conflict in my romance. Not too much, I hate angst for the sake of angst, but a tad more would be nice.* I've been thinking about it since then and I've changed my mind. I don't think this is the type of book that needs a lot of conflict. It's humorous wish-fulfillment for whoever reads it. It doesn't need to be anything

other than what it is. Anyway back to the original review -- However, I feel the same way about Shane as I did about Reg in *Past Imperfections*: I DON'T GIVE A FLYING FUCK. Color me I DON'T GIVE A SHIT. I love Shane, I love his jockstraps and *I love how much he likes/loves Mason*. I especially love his attempts to impress Mason and his sexual fantasies. He's a bookworm's dream come true. I want to smoosh his face between my boobs and shout "woobie, woobie, woobie!" (Except that would also constitute sexual harassment. Dammit.)

The main conflict, or why I hate that selfish jerk who I won't name due to spoilers.

I was impressed by the novel's main conflict. (view spoiler) I was actually worried that this conflict wouldn't work out to everyone's satisfaction but luckily, it did. But I still want to hit a certain someone over the head with a skillet.

A less exhausting Tell Me It's Real.

I agree with another reviewer that said this book is similar to *Tell Me It's Real*. They're both funny, they both use first person narrative and both narrators speak directly to the reader. I like *Tell Me*, it's hilarious, but I frequently find T.J. Klune's rat-a-tat-tat gunfire humor, followed by heavy angst, exhausting. I found the sarcastic humor in this book to be a little more relaxing. There's a lack of vagina mentions, a lack of running into walls & no running over love-interest with a car. However, there is a lesbian-biker grandma that is as over the top as the parents in *Tell me* who likes to drop unnecessary comments about sexual acts as well.

So why 4 stars instead of 5? Well, I think the writing could be tighter, a little less wordy in parts. Other than that I really enjoyed this book. It's a great lighthearted, funny read by an author I expect will only improve as time goes by.
