I liked the second book in the Bubba Snoddy series much better than the first. I think the reason for this was twofold. After everything was resolved (the ending of the first book in the series), and Bubba cleared of the murder charges against him, life was really good for a few months. He had a hard time solving the case in which he stood accused of murder the last time.

Now, once in a while Deputy Willodean Gray, single and pretty, was flashing an encouraging smile at Bubba. Life was showing some promise indeed.
