## **Rachel says**

If I was interested in bunny dreams, this book would quickly cure me of that curiosity. This is a shame, since McCarty's illustrations are lovely. The concept, however, falls flat as readers follow simple-minded bunnies into their underground tunnels and dreamland. Why a chicken is suddenly underground with them, I don't know. Why they actually multiply from each page spread to another is odd, but I can handle that. It's when alliterative acid trips of flying bunnies over a big blue dog, which eerily resembles a bunny with paws, erupts into bunnies making declarative statements about what they know. It's just clunky and odd, instead of fanciful and fun. Not recommended.
