The Man Plan is a short, sweet Christmas read by Australian author, Elise K. Ackers. After enjoying Ackers' romantic suspense novel, Small Town Storm which was one of the debut lines with Destiny Romance I immediately snapped up a copy of The Man Plan which falls into the contemporary romance spectrum.

Cora is nearing thirty and following the death of her father is desperate to find a partner and build a family and future. She's put a lot of thought and research into finding 'the one' and comes up with a master strategy, the Man Plan. She throws herself into "creatable situations" like faking a car breakdown or going to the gym to meet prospective men. She doesn't have much luck. What's more, she's set herself the deadline of finding a man by Christmas- only three months away.

When her neighbour, sarcastic and witty Matt Shelley turns up on her doorstep complaining of noise disruption (Cora is playing songs by Adele very loudly!) he's instantly intrigued by her. He makes himself at home in her apartment and she inadvertently tells him about her plan. He, being a guy who has no intention to marry or settle down is quickly crossed off Cora's list of potential men and they fall into a comfortable friendship quickly. They see each other daily; they go to the movies, cook dinner together and basically mirror a couple without any of the physical benefits!

Against his better judgement, Matt finds he really likes spending time with Cora and the interest she sparks in other men actually makes him jealous! Matt has poor role models for a healthy relationship, his parent's have an abusive marriage and he thinks himself unworthy of Cora's love. He fights his feelings for her, pushing her away and making himself more miserable. Cora is confused by his behaviour, but she's even more confused by the strong feelings she is developing for her friend.

What I liked about the internal conflict that Acker's creates for Cora; it isn't the typical I have to find a husband dilemma which I tend to find a little cringe worthy-a man can make a woman whole. Rather, Cora desperately wanted someone to share her life with, someone to put her first and to think about her and build a future with. It wasn't all about finding a husband, but about building a life with someone. Initially I thought Cora a little desperate, but this conflict added another layer which made me empathise with her. Even though it is a shorter novel, Ackers still manages to create believable character conflict for Matt too and so the romance that develops between them is believable and so is its resolution.

I really recommend this contemporary Christmas read by Australian author, Elise K. Ackers. The Man Plan is a pleasant holiday read which will leave you feeling warm and fuzzy by the end.

Well, well, well...this little gem was hiding way too long on my kindle and never-ending tbr. Why...seriously, why did it take me so long to read this!?! This was such a fantastically witty, funny and sweet contemporary romance with lots of heart!

Cora is twenty-nine years old and has hit a rough patch in her life with a deafening thud. Having recently lost her father (who was the only remaining family she had), Cora realizes that she really hasn't built much of a life for herself. She enjoyed her job, loved and took care of her dad and let life pass her by. Now she finds herself all alone. A handful of acquaintances, all of which come in a pair, her dog and her career are the only things that keep her from being a complete recluse. She's decided that enough is enough! She will no longer sit back and wait for things to "happen" to her...no longer wait for someone to ring her doorbell and introduce himself as her soulmate.

"She couldn't keep on this way. Every morning wishing that someone would see her. Every night lying in bed, turned from the second pillow because it mocked her...Cora had a life worth sharing, and a full, giving heart that was tired of twiddling its proverbial thumbs."

So it's time to set her life straight. The biggest thing she wants is someone to share her life with. To belong to someone. To be a "we" instead of a "me." She decides she needs to put together a plan to get a man...A Man Plan. She gathers all the romance novels she has, compiles an extensive batch of romantic movies and uses every opportunity to study ways to meet men. Matt grew up with parents who basically hate each other, but remain married to this day. He doesn’t understand why? They take every opportunity to tell each other, him and anyone who will listen how much they despise each other. Who wants to grow into that? Certainly not Matt. He’ll help Cora with her plan, offer his support, but he wants nothing to do with a long-term relationship and especially not marriage. He spends his time poking fun of her and her wild antics for meeting men...at one point she takes the tire off her car so she can play the “damsel in distress” bit...he even nicely offers to help her write her online dating profile.

“I’m only twenty-nine, but life’s not moving fast enough. Bring your engagement ring because this is going to be a whirlwind courtship. I’ll supply the bassinet. Sanity not included.”

Come on...that’s some great support!! What started as a friendship built on wacky circumstances and a desperate man plan, turns into genuine companionship. Matt and Cora find themselves spending a lot of time together...going out to dinner, drinks, shopping, basketball games, etc...They have the same quirky sense of humor, find it easy to be around each other, the conversation flows effortlessly and they just genuinely like being together. Cora has to keep reminding herself that Matt sets expiration dates on the women in his life, otherwise she’d start to think he was perfect for her.

Things aren’t so easy in Matt’s mind. He’s starting to get confused. He finds himself looking forward to seeing Cora, hearing from her, constantly seeing things that remind him of her or having something happen and thinking that he can’t wait to tell her about it. He doesn’t like where this is going...not one bit!

“...his mind was busier since meeting her; full of memories and wants that felt to his heart like licks of fire. A life of keeping people at arm’s length and Cora had swanned in as if his walls were an unlocked gate. He wasn’t quite sure how she’d done it and he wasn’t quite sure how he could undo it.”

And then Matt’s worst nightmare happens. The inevitable, earth-shattering, soul-crushing, how the fuck did this happen moment where he realizes he’s fallen in love with Cora.

If real life wasn't kicking my ass, I could have easily read this book in a single sitting. Cora has had enough of being alone. Now that her father is dead, she has no family left, no boyfriend, and no one to spend Christmas with, and she's never felt so lonely. It's September now, and she comes to a decision: she will take matters into her own hands, meet a man, and have someone to spend Christmas with. And, hopefully, the rest of her life, too.

The night she stays up doing "research" - poring over romance books and movies - her loud music brings her downstairs neighbour, Matt, up to complain. They've never met before, but soon Matt is hearing all about

"the man plan" - a safe person to talk to, since Cora quickly learns he doesn't commit and has no interest in finding a woman to love and stay with.

Their friendship takes off from there. Cora finds it easy to talk to Matt and share her ideas for meeting men, and doesn't mind when he laughs at her - like when she pretends she can't change a tyre while wearing skimpy shorts, waiting for a man to offer assistance. And Matt enjoys spending time with Cora, hanging out on the weekends, making her dinner - she's a low maintenance friend, a woman who's not trying to get into his pants. Their feelings for each other creep up unnoticed, and, they each think, unreciprocated. Worse, they both think there's no point. Cora understands that Matt could never offer her what she wants, what she needs. And Matt, an only child, still suffers from the emotional and verbal abuse of his parents, who hate each other and drag their son into their conflicts. With role models like that, he doesn't even think he's capable of having a real relationship.

It will take a leap of faith from both of them to not let this chance go, to take a risk and leap together.

Quite simply, I LOVED this book. It had everything I liked and plenty I didn't even know I liked. Maybe I don't read enough contemporary romance, but it was fresh and, while staying true to the genre, deviated from many typical cliches. Matt was no billionaire, for a start. He's a hard-working middle class man, a project manager for a construction company. His parents are middle class too, though the way they speak to each other, and to him, makes them sound incredibly vulgar and lower class. Cora, likewise, is middle class, working as an editor at a publishing house. This puts them on equal footing from the beginning. Money isn't an obstacle or a sticking point. An abundance of it doesn't give Matt a position of authority over Cora. No, they're just two adults who live in a low-rise apartment building in Port Melbourne, the kind of people that Melbourne is full of (especially in the suburbs around the bay), and this is the fun and lively story of two of them meeting.

One of the things I loved about this book was its tone. Ackers writes with a light, friendly, bantering kind of tone, setting an atmosphere that is so welcoming, warm and, why not: cuddly. The kind of story you can snuggle with, a real comfort read. It connects with your emotions without being at all melodramatic or manipulative, and is realistic and familiar in setting, plot and characters which makes it easy to simply enjoy it for its own sake. It's well grounded in the familiar, with popular culture references and a running Superman joke. There's also humour here, with light banter between Matt and Cora, and some of the characters are funny in the way they're described. Matt continuously makes fun of Cora, calling her crazy because of her man plan, and in true Aussie style, she goes along with it, giving as good as she gets.

She watched him, too surprised to comment. He dumped the pan into the sink, ran the water for a moment then helped himself to the cutlery drawer. Seconds later, he was pressing the bowl into her hands, a fork poking out of the top. She gazed down at the spaghetti bolognese.

"Are we sharing?"

He laughed. "No. That's just for you."

"Where's yours?"

"Are you kidding? I don't want to have dinner with you. You're as nuts as they come; you'd probably think it meant something and then go ahead and fall in love with me."

"You're safe there," she muttered, stung yet amused. "I'd never fall in love with someone like you."

"Someone like me?"

"A hopeless case. What's the point of falling in love on your own?"

"I couldn't agree more. And on that note, I'm out of here."

It was so much fun, watching their friendship grow, seeing Matt become increasingly jealous of the men Cora does meet, yet in such good-natured denial about his own feelings. He doesn't agonise over it, his turmoil isn't belaboured, there's just enough self-reflection to flesh him out and get the reader on the same page, without boring you. Certainly there are men out there who are like Matt without having any kind of reason for it, it's just their lifestyle of choice and I don't know, maybe they're just inherently selfish. While there are other romance books where the male lead is reluctant to commit because of his parents' example (like Jennifer Probst's *The Marriage Bargain*, as a recent example), but the fact that Matt's parents are just so ordinary in every other way, and whose horribleness is so believable without the artificial gloss of wealth - everyday people are much more relatable, rather than alienating, and this was, overall, one of the things I loved the most about this book.

It didn't hurt that I loved Cora and Matt. Cora is grieving over the loss of her father, but turns her loneliness into a positive plan for action, rather than wallowing. She's frank and open about it, and her motivations are believable, understandable, and make her very human.

"... I want someone for me. Just for me. Who gives a damn if they don't hear from me during the day, who calls *me* with their news. I want to be someone's top priority." She pressed her thumb and forefinger to her closed eyes and sighed. "I know it sounds like a lot to ask, but it's really not. I just want to be the one for someone. I want to be a part of something bigger than me."

He was quiet for so long that she lifted her head and opened her eyes.

"This Man Plan..." he said, trailing off.

"Feminists might hate me for saying it, but I need a man. If a man loves me, he might marry me. If he marries me, we might have kids."

"You want to build a family for yourself."

She nodded. "Exactly. My parents met when they were toddlers. My mother once pushed mud into my dad's mouth. They went through school together and became a couple at my mum's fourteenth birthday party. They completed each other, you know? They were all either of them ever needed and they took on the world together. I want that. Even to be a fraction as happy as they were would be a dream come true."

And that is, of course, the point of romance fiction, why it's the biggest selling genre of all genres: the fantasy - if it even is a fantasy - lives strongly within us. Because very few people actually like being alone. Matt thinks he does, he likes his life, but after spending so much time with Cora - on outings and hanging out that, to anyone but those two, looks clearly like they're a couple - his life starts to feel increasingly empty without her. There was good solid chemistry between them, a slow-burning sexual tension, one that isn't satisfied until the very end - and no graphic content (if you like romance but don't like the sex scenes, you might be interested to hear that).

And finally, I loved the conversation between Will and Cora at the end, that made her take that risk, to take a chance on Matt.

"Tell me this: do you think he is *incapable* of love?"

"No."

"Then do you believe that when - yes, when he falls in love with you - that he'll do it to whatever capacity he can?"

Something light and ticklish fluttered in her stomach. She pressed a hand there to stop it. "Yes."
He nodded. "Isn't that enough? Isn't that all we can ask of anyone - to love us with all that they are?"

Her hand found her mouth. "I'm being an idiot, aren't I?"

"No, Cora. You're just taking a breath before you take the biggest chance of your life. [...] Don't do this if you're hoping to change him."

She blinked up at her old friend, aghast. But then she considered this more deeply. Will waited in silence, understanding the gravity of the moment, then he smiled when he saw something new in her eyes.

"He's perfect as he is."

"Right answer."

Yep. I completely adored this book.

Well-Planned Love Arc

There are four elements to every love story that make up the love arc. First, we must start out with a man and woman (or any variation or number thereof in 21st century Earth) who have internal and/or external needs. Second, a problem arises that creates conflict between the two. Then as our hero and heroine try to solve this conflict their internal and external baggage gets in the way, creating wonderful tension down the path towards love. And finally, as they realize their love is once in a lifetime stuff, they find a way to claim their baggage and start their journey towards happily-ever-after together.

That's every romance novel in a nutshell.

The Man Plan followed this arc perfectly with a simple, yet quirky, plot; likeable, well-thought out characters; and well-written prose. Cora, our heroine, has recently lost her father and she's having trouble dealing with that loss (her internal baggage). She meets Matt, our hero, who has commitment issues because his family is seriously dysfunctional (his internal baggage). Christmas is fast approaching and Cora is determined to be in a pair-bond by that family-themed Holiday. So, she devises a Man Plan to achieve this goal.

Her Man Plan is truly inspired and all single gals should take note. From the flat tire in Daisy Dukes to her attempts at giving out her number at red lights using hand signals, Cora is on a mission to eradicate her single status. Matt, who's at first amused, comes to detest the plan (conflict), but his banged up, grinchy heart keeps his mouth shut and his hands to himself. Matt begins to monopolize all of Cora's time and throw wrenches into her Man Plan. But still, he can't man up even though he's coming to realize what he's feeling is indeed love. And for her part, Cora is terrified to trust Matt with her heart when she knows he has no clue what to do with it.

Ackers takes this simple, predictable plot and tells a sweet story. Cora and Matt's chemistry is a slow burn.

There's no heavy loaded exposition where we learn each characters' entire life story in chapter one before the word "go." All backstory is woven in and appears when appropriate to the storyline -thank you Ms Ackers! Other than an intense, uncomfortable emotional in-burst at the top of the story; and an intense, uncomfortable emotional out-burst at the tail of the story, I thought this was a perfectly paced romance. But I have to say that I was quite taken aback at the Breakfast at Tiffany's style love scene. You know the scene: Holly Golightly and Paul hang up their masks and start kissing. Then fade to black and its the next morning. I think that must be Destiny Romance's style. I wanted something with a few more jalapenos!
