One, the first chapter actually, that informs the reader that it is continued in another volume entirely and then there are three issues of the regular *Totally Awesome Hulk* series that are skipped over. This became a very frustrating volume to read.

The Totally Awesome Hulk Vol. 4 is one of those volumes where they collect multiple storylines and plots all into one volume. Unfortunately that means that we don't really get a cohesive plot for the volume either, which is a bit disappointing.

I wasn't able to confirm the reading order for this, so I went by the publication dates so decide the order that I read them in (because that's how they'd be read if I was buying them as they came out). In that case it's Moon Girl and the Devil Dinosaur 4, The Totally Awesome Hulk 1.MU, The Totally Awesome Hulk #19, Generations: Banner Hulk & Totally Awesome Hulk 1, The Totally Awesome Hulk 23.

As other reviewers have commented, this is another money spinning venture. Taking issues involving other story arcs and compiling them. It doesn't make sense if you try to read them in sequence. Not that the stories are great to begin with.

This collection is too scattershot, tying into Weapons of Mutant Destruction and Monsters Unleashed and including an old issue of Moon Girl (way out of sequence, right?)

It seems like whatever was going on in Volume 1 is still going on. Pak should just tell us his big idea about the Hulk already.

If you have been keeping up with Marvel events, this Volume is mostly "side-story and filler". We have tie-ins to : Weapons of Mutant Destruction, Moon-Girl and Devil Dinosaur, Monsters Unleashed, and Generations. The last story is where the new material comes in...

Amadeus Cho has always struggled with "Hulk" in some ways. Psychologically, he keeps Hulk "locked" in the trunk of a car in his mind. Seeking better to understand his relationship to the big guy, he gathers the psychic help of Jake Oh, Ms. Marvel, Silk, Black Panther, and his sister Maddy. They are able to protect him mentally as he talks with Hulk, while in the physical world, Hulk is "smashing" the moon. The physical stress he is exerting triggers the fail-safe plan: If Hulk is about to destroy the moon, a ship will coalesce around him and shoot him off into space. We are greeted with the message "Next Time: Return to Planet Hulk" YES! Lets hope this one is as great as the previous!

With this Volume, *Totally Awesome Hulk* ends. Been a pretty good run, but I look forward to the return of Bruce Banner as well.

Why is this volume even a thing? It collects issues 19 and 23 of the main series, the Generations one-shot, the Monsters Unleashed one-shot, and an issue of Moon Girl & Devil Dinosaur, because why the hell not.

Trades like this irritate the hell out of me. Collect these issues where they're more appropriate, don't just throw them all together because you need a new trade. Issues 19 and 23 are tie-ins to Weapons Of Mutant Destruction, so they could have been put in there. The Monsters Unleashed one-shot adds nothing to the main series, while the Generations one-shot is bland and feels ultimately pointless. I'm not even going to start on collecting a Moon Girl issue here just to pad space.

Just. Why. It's stuff like this that puts me off otherwise impressive series, which is what *Totally Awesome* has been up to this point.

Just a bunch of disconnected crossover issues. Not sure why they collected them into a single Hulk trade. I'm sure the individual stories were fine, but as I only have one issue of each here I couldn't say.

Does the world need another Smart Hulk?

Peter David ran with that concept back in the ‘90’s and did a nice job – letting Bruce Banner’s intellect run the Hulk show. Here, you have Amadeus Cho, who’s become Monsieur Hulk, sans court mandated anger management classes, for the greater good. So?

I thought really hard and my conclusion: Meh!

Still, I’ve always liked Amadeus Cho...

Yeah, that’s the guy, but this volume hung on some sort of “monster” crossover event/theme and isn’t really the bestest place to jump into Hulk 2.0.

It starts off well, with Amadeus Hulk going up against adamantium-laced-mutant-hating cyborgs with a team-up with Old Man Logan, Domino and Old-But-Not-Quite-AARP-ready Sabretooth in the works.

I was already to dig this volume when it got messy:

The Whiny Moon Girl and Devil Dinosaur with a Special Guest Star appearance by the Hulk is included because the Dinosaur is a misunderstood monster with “Devil” in his name.

Also, in South Korea, Amadeus Hulk fights a weird thought control monster in a non-smarty-pants-Hulk-ish way – punching the crap out of him.

Because the ability to solve a Rubik’s Cube in five minutes wasn’t really in the job description.

And, Amadeus has a sister and she’s in contact with Hellbender.

Just what Marvel needs – yet another over-sized busty super-strong heroine.

What’s a Hulk book without an appearance by Herr Hulk himself, Bruce Banner?

Oddly, Amadeus has to travel back in time for this team-up.

What a revolting and confounding development.

Dealing with anger issues while dumpster diving never worked for me either, Dr. Banner. Just sayin'.

Something's lacking in Amadeus Hulk. Why it's the unleashed fury of Pappy Hulk. Amadeus with a little help from his friends tries to tap into the rage.

Squeeze in some repressed guilt and it's possibly Hulk-Smash? Because who likes a thoughtful, circumspect Hulk?

Bottom line - This was an ill-conceived Hulk volume – little if any continuity *and* any storyline with legs gets passed over. When will comic book publishers abandon the everything-but the-kitchen-sink book mentality? The sum of the parts don't equal a viable gamma-irradiated whole. I sometimes like Amadeus and his winsome approach to the Hulk, but not here. As Marty Robbins would say, "El Paso".

Pak's writing is worth more than three stars, but this is a sampler with issues from various different plotlines and events, so it doesn't hold up as a collection (it would be fine if they were all standalone but they're excerpts from larger story arcs). Bruce's old teenage buddy, genius Amadeus Cho, has saved Bruce by transferring the Hulk's power to himself (Bruce died anyway). In this TPB he teams up with Wolverine, battles Devil Dinosaur, jumps back in time to join forces with Bruce Banner and begins to discover that just because he doesn't have Bruce's abused past doesn't mean his Hulk will behave better. Good writing, just an unsatisfactory collection.

There was nothing really wrong with this volume other than the fact that it was a bit of a random collection of issues with not much connection other than that the Hulk was in them.
