The story is endearing, but not preachy. The illustrations are superb -- edgy and fun, but not scary. The use of alliteration in the rhymes and the simple sing-song rhythm make the book easy to read.

The version available on iBookstore for the iPad appears to be much more interactive than other offerings on Amazon, but I suppose that's a matter of limitations of the Kindle format than anything else. The kids really enjoy the multi-track narration, and particularly love the cowboy accent. The activities are engaging, and range in complexity from sound boards to drag-and-drop puzzles.

The text doesn't have a play or interact with the pictures which I think was a good idea, because that would have been distracting and the child like hand writing seems to be enough.

I can't really say that I liked this book because of the pictures, but the little parts i did like come from the text. The pictures were very cartoon like and didn't really have a lot of detail and the ability to draw me in. I

don't believe they were bad illustrations, because a child while find them interesting. One thing I did like about the illustrations was that they showed exactly what the words said, so that the book could be just looked at and the text would not have to be read.
