An interesting book to read, while the basic idea that when the ancient stories and legends tell of people from the stars travelling to and fro from craft orbiting the earth in a clearly technological aircraft, they were telling the truth rather than being allegorical is not all that controversial in itself other than to "mainstream" archaeologists there are some notable flaws.

For example the idea that man could not have evolved the idea of mathematics so it must have been genetically installed in humanity fails to consider that the alien races must have evolved the idea of mathematics which renders the theory that it could not have evolved obviously wrong, and the final chapter on Alien Abductions seems to have very little relevance to anything in the rest of the book to the extent that it could have been already written and added later.

Remember that this man was convicted of fraud relating to a jewellery transaction in his early life. With thanks to Wikipedia "At the age of 19, von Däniken was caught stealing money, both from an innkeeper and from a camp where he was employed as a youth leader, and was given a four-month suspended sentence. The psychiatrist who examined von Däniken at the time described him as displaying a "tendency to lie". Von Däniken was withdrawn from his school, and became apprenticed to a Swiss hotelier for a time, before moving to Egypt. While in Egypt, he was involved in a jewelry deal which resulted in a nine-month conviction for fraud and embezzlement upon his return to Switzerland" Then the theme park set up in Interlaken closed because it was unable to pay its creditors. "One of Interlaken's top tourist attractions, the Mystery Park, has closed its doors for the last time. The theme park, opened in May 2003, was devoted to unsolved extraterrestrial mysteries, and was the brainchild of best-selling Swiss author Erich von Däniken.
